Cultural Policy

PURPOSE

The purpose of the City of Adelaide's inaugural Cultural Policy is to promote and support the city's unique cultural identity and opportunities to strengthen Adelaide's role as a global cultural capital through to 2036.

It aligns with the UNESCO Creative Cities mission, recognising that Adelaide is Australia's first and only UNESCO Creative City of Music and is part of a global network committed to fully capitalising on its cultural assets and using them as foundational elements for sustainable, inclusive and balanced development across economic, social, cultural and environmental dimensions.

The Cultural Policy informs a unified and collaborative approach across the City of Adelaide and its subsidiaries in valuing, protecting, championing, and promoting the city's unique character, identity, history, creativity, cultural life and communities. It guides strategic investment in infrastructure, funding programs, partnerships, resources, events, initiatives and activities.

CONTEXT

Adelaide / Tarntanya is the Capital City, the civic and cultural heart of South Australia, and a vibrant gateway to the regions. It is the traditional Country of the Kaurna people of the Adelaide Plains, and we honour and respect their continuous culture, custodianship, and relationship with this land.

It is unique in its design as the world's only city surrounded by Park Lands resulting from the vision of the Surveyor General of South Australia, Colonel William Light. Our community has a proud history of advocating for the protection of our city's distinctive heritage and cultural assets.

Adelaide was founded on ideas of social and political freedom and has been shaped by the diverse cultures and communities it has welcomed over generations. A University city and innovation hub, Adelaide continues to attract global talent, investment and new industries, as one of Australia's most competitive places to do business.

Renowned for its hospitality, with exceptional food and wine, world-class festivals, centres of creative excellence, art and cultural attractions and collections, Adelaide is home to one of the largest undercover fresh produce markets in the Southern Hemisphere, is one of 10 Wine Capitals of the World, is Australia's Festival Capital and the nation's first and only, UNESCO City of Music.

The Cultural Policy aligns with and enables the four pillars of the City of Adelaide Strategic Plan 2024-2028:

- Building a vibrant, connected and inclusive COMMUNITY
- Creating a resilient, protected and sustainable ENVIRONMENT
- Growing and developing an innovative and responsive ECONOMY
- Creating interesting, purposeful and safe PLACES.

The City of Adelaide acknowledges the Kaurna people as the Traditional Owners of the Country where the city of Adelaide is situated, and pays its respect to Elders past, present and emerging.

PRINCIPLES. PRIORITIES & ROLE

The Cultural Policy sets out core principles that affirm the inherent value and importance of culture, creativity and community to our city's distinctive identity and future prosperity. All policy principles hold equal value and are applied without any hierarchical ranking or order of importance acknowledging that the city's cultural life is complex, dynamic and interconnected.

For each principle, the priorities and the role of the City of Adelaide are clearly defined, ensuring transparency and accountability. In this way, the Cultural Policy establishes a shared responsibility across the organisation to prioritise culture in future planning, investment, partnerships, and resource allocation.

The principles, priorities and role of the City of Adelaide reflect and are responsive to the vision of the Council and its subsidiaries and Committees, as well as the needs of the community and other key stakeholders.

PRINCIPLE: AMPLIFYING OUR CREATIVE CAPITAL

The City of Adelaide aims to be Australia's cultural and creative capital by nurturing careers and sector growth and supporting talent retention, through partnerships and co-investment. By leveraging its UNESCO Creative City status, Adelaide showcases local talent globally, driving economic growth through its cultural sector.

This principle is reflected in the following priorities that acknowledge that Adelaide is a cultural and creative capital:

- Amplify Adelaide's UNESCO City of Music designation to showcase the city's cultural life, talent, strengths and stories on the global stage.
- Support cultural jobs and creative careers to position culture and creativity as key drivers of economic development, employment, imagination and innovation.
- Celebrate Adelaide's unique cultural identity and enable opportunities for international exchange and collaboration.

Council's role in leading Adelaide as a Cultural and Creative Capital:

Lead: Drive Adelaide's growth as a cultural tourism destination and creative capital through strategic planning and leveraging relationships with government, universities, the private sector, non-government organisations, peak bodies and individuals to invest in creative sector growth.

Enable: Support local creatives at all stages, backgrounds, and abilities, nurturing cultural jobs and professions, community-led enterprises to drive city prosperity. **Promote:** Showcase Adelaide's culture, talent, and stories globally through the UNESCO Creative Cities Network and Sister Cities.

PRINCIPLE: CULTURALLY INCLUSIVE AND SOCIALLY CONNECTED

Honouring the *Universal Declaration of Human Rights*, the City of Adelaide is committed to ensuring that everyone has the right to participate in, enjoy, and contribute to the city's cultural life. We prioritise equitable, culturally safe, and affordable access for communities of all abilities and backgrounds and actively celebrate diverse cultural expressions. Culture fosters social connection, wellbeing, and a sense of belonging, enriching the everyday life of our city.

This principle is reflected in the following priorities, recognising that people are at the heart of our city and its culture.

- Enable all people to contribute, participate and be represented in the cultural life
 of the city.
- Ensure that access to Adelaide's culture is easy and affordable for everyone, with a focus on:
 - young people

- > older people
- > people living with disabilities,
- culturally and linguistically diverse communities, including both migrant and refugee people
- women and
- LGBTQIA+ communities.
- Promote a cultural life in Adelaide that showcases the strength of our sector and the diversity of our communities.

Council's role in recognising that people are at the heart of our city and its culture: **Lead:** Integrate accessibility, intersectionality, inclusivity, and equity into cultural planning and delivery.

Enable: Develop, facilitate, and support affordable, accessible and community-led cultural experiences for City of Adelaide venues, public spaces, neighbourhoods, precincts, and throughout the Adelaide Park Lands.

Partner: Leverage Adelaide's status as a creative capital to advocate for transport improvements that enhance access to culture and support sector workers.

Promote: Enable equitable access to digital tools and platforms, and ensure that digital innovation supports cultural diversity, equity, and inclusion.

PRINCIPLE: RECONCILIATION AND TRUTH-TELLING

The City of Adelaide acknowledges the Kaurna people as the traditional custodians of the Adelaide Plains and fully supports Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander self-determination. We recognise the importance of addressing past injustices, centring First Nations perspectives, and promoting cultural revitalisation through language, storytelling, and creative expression.

This principle is reflected in the following priorities that honour the continuous cultures of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples.

- Honour and strengthen awareness of Kaurna culture and connection to Country.
- Celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and cultures in city design, public art, festivals, events, and public spaces.
- Support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander-led cultural initiatives, including cultural revitalisation through language, storytelling, cultural burns, and other cultural and creative practices.

Council's role in honouring the continuous cultures of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples:

Lead: Embed Reconciliation and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' perspectives in policies, city planning and design and cultural programs.

Protect: Respect Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander rights, self-determination, and cultural heritage by showcasing, celebrating and amplifying cultures and connection to Country.

Enable: Support, facilitate, and collaborate on Kaurna and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural initiatives, including public art, festivals, events, language revitalisation, storytelling, and cultural practices.

PRINCIPLE: PRESERVING CULTURAL HERITAGE, EMBRACING PROGRESS

The City of Adelaide is committed to preserving its cultural and natural heritage and embracing revitalisation and progress. We celebrate and strengthen our world-class architecture, cultural assets, collections, and Park Lands, ensuring Adelaide's distinctive identity and history are preserved for future generations. The city also supports diverse cultural traditions, including national commemorations, festive events, and social practices that reflect and unite the community.

CULTURAL POLICY

This principle is reflected in the following priorities acknowledging the connection between the city's culture and its built and natural heritage while balancing modernisation with preservation:

- Protect and revitalise the city's cultural heritage including world-class architecture, iconic cultural venues, community managed spaces and collections, and preserving the Adelaide Park Lands, open spaces and natural environment.
- Ensure people, culture and creativity are at the centre of planning, design and development decisions in the city.
- Celebrate our local character, food, culture, customs, social practices and traditions, places and spaces.

Council's role in preserving cultural heritage and embracing progress:

Lead: Identify gaps and opportunities to strengthen policies and plans, and streamline processes to prioritise people, culture, creativity and heritage preservation.

Partner: Advocate for the value of Adelaide's heritage locally and internationally to influence policies and attract investment among the levers to safeguard Adelaide's festivals, built heritage, cultural venues, natural environments, and community traditions

Enable: Support and promote projects that revitalise heritage, encourage adaptive reuse, and celebrate cultural expressions, initiatives and communities.

Promote: Highlight Adelaide's architecture, natural sites, traditions, social and cultural practices through events, storytelling and public art.

PRINCIPLE: CREATING SPACE FOR CULTURAL EXPRESSION

Council is committed to enhancing the city's vibrancy, liveability, and global profile through accessible, high-quality, and diverse cultural infrastructure, experiences, public art and activations, designed to foster connection, creativity, and cultural expression.

This principle is reflected in the following priorities that foster and celebrate a creative and culturally connected vibrant city and community.

- Embed creativity and culture into the everyday life of the city.
- Expand the city's cultural infrastructure, including activating underutilised spaces, to enhance Adelaide's appeal, foster community and create a sense of belonging.
- Ensure that creativity, along with Adelaide's unique arts, cultural experiences, and stories, is easily accessible, fuelling the city's vitality, day and night, and all yearround.

Council's role in fostering and celebrating a creative and culturally connected vibrant city and community:

Lead: Integrate creativity and culture into all aspects of city life, infrastructure and initiatives through strategic and streamlined planning, licensing, and public space use processes.

Enable: Facilitate, support, and deliver diverse and safe cultural experiences year-round in partnership with government, the private and cultural sectors and community, balancing small and large-scale cultural and community events across a diversity of spaces and the Park Lands.

Promote: Celebrate and elevate Adelaide's cultural life to enhance access to cultural experiences and opportunities and attract new audiences and investment.

APPLICATION

The City of Adelaide is part of a dynamic cultural ecosystem, a hyper-networked and innovative society that thrives through cross-sector collaboration.

To deliver on the vision for Adelaide's cultural life through to 2036, it will be vital to:

- Leverage networks, forums and, relationships at international, national, state and local levels.
- Partner with government, non-government organisations including, the private sector, education institutions, philanthropic entities, multicultural and, the community;
- Access expertise, attract resources, and sustain the city's cultural and economic growth.

The Cultural Policy 2025-2036 guides the City of Adelaide in establishing culture as a central pillar of urban and environmental planning, city growth, economic development, social cohesion, and community life to enhance Adelaide's reputation as a global cultural capital and contribute to a creative, connected, safe, resilient, inclusive, and sustainable city.

The principles and priorities of the Cultural Policy 2025–2036 will be embedded across strategies, operations, budgets, and work plans throughout the organisation, including Council subsidiaries. Its implementation will be guided by clear deliverables, appropriate resources, and measurable actions—supporting ongoing evaluation, transparency, and alignment with community and sector needs. This cohesive and considered approach represents an efficient, effective and economical use of public resources through annual business plans and budget processes.

EVALUATION

The City of Adelaide will implement appropriate governance and evaluation processes to ensure the Cultural Policy 2025-2036 delivers on its purpose, ensures effective resource allocation, drives meaningful and measurable progress, and the impact of Council's investment and decisions on the culture of the community are understood and valued. National best practices will be used in collaboration with capital city councils, the Australian Local Government Association, State and Federal Governments, peak bodies and institutions of research and learning.

The City of Adelaide will:

- Communicate achievements, challenges, and future priorities.
- Conduct a review every four years to ensure relevance, responsiveness to external factors, and alignment with current and future needs of the community.

GLOSSARY

Throughout this document, the following terms have been used and are defined as:

Culture

Culture is a fundamental human right that enriches lives, fosters creativity, and shapes identity. It reflects our way of life, values, traditions, and beliefs, expressed through art, architecture, festivals, food, language, literature, and music. The City of Adelaide's Cultural Policy defines culture as including the arts, creative industries, and heritage sectors, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural practices, diverse identities shaped by migration and history, and cultural expressions reflecting contemporary Adelaide.

Creative

A creative is an individual or group engaged in artistic expression, innovation, and cultural production, generating cultural, social, and economic value. In this policy, creatives include artists, performers, musicians, designers, architects, digital media professionals, writers, filmmakers, storytellers, cultural practitioners, and heritage workers. They shape identity, foster connections, and drive economic growth, making them essential to Adelaide's thriving cultural landscape.

Cultural Infrastructure

Cultural infrastructure includes physical, digital, and social spaces that support art, culture, and community engagement. It covers galleries, museums, theatres, creative hubs, public spaces, festivals and heritage sites, as well as digital platforms that expand cultural access. This valuable resource strengthens Adelaide's cultural, social, and economic vitality, reinforcing its identity as a vibrant and creative city.

Disability

In the City of Adelaide' Cultural Policy, people with disabilities include those who have long-term physical, psycho-social, mental, intellectual, cognitive, neurological or sensory impairments, which in interaction with various barriers, may hinder their full

and effective participation in community and cultural life on an equal basis with others.

Heritage

Refers to the legacy of tangible and intangible assets inherited from past generations, maintained in the present, and passed on to future generations. It encompasses both cultural and natural elements that hold historical, social or environmental significance.

Self-Determination

Self-determination is an ongoing process of ensuring that peoples are able to make decisions about matters that affect their lives. Essential to the exercise of self-determination is choice, participation and control.

Truth-Telling

Truth-telling enables a fuller and more accurate account of Australia's history to recognise the strength and contribution of Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples. It acknowledges the historical silencing of injustices and ongoing impacts of colonisation on First Nations peoples. Truth-telling is fundamental to advancing Reconciliation.

Universal Declaration of Human Rights

The Universal Declaration of Human Rights is an international milestone document that sets out fundamental human rights to be universally protected at a global and local level. These are the basic rights and freedoms that belong to every person, everywhere, simply because they are human. These rights are inalienable, meaning, they cannot be taken away, and they apply regardless of nationality, race, gender, religion, language, or any other status. They include civil, political, economic, social, and cultural rights. Specifically, Article 27, grants everyone the freedom to engage in cultural activities, enjoy artistic expressions, and benefit from scientific progress. In this Policy, the *Universal Declaration of Human Rights* is referenced to highlight City of Adelaide's equity responsibilities in respect to cultural rights, to ensure that everyone has the right to participate in, enjoy, and contribute to the city's cultural life.

ADMINISTRATIVE

As part of Council's commitment to deliver the City of Adelaide Strategic Plan, services to the community and the provision of transparent information, all policy documents are reviewed as per legislative requirements or when there is no such provision a risk assessment approach is taken to guide the review timeframe.

This Policy document will be reviewed every 4 years unless legislative or operational change occurs beforehand. The next review is required in 2029.

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Draft Cultural Policy

Community Consultation Stage 2

May 2025

Background

The purpose of the City of Adelaide's Cultural Policy is to promote and support the city's unique cultural identity and opportunities to strengthen Adelaide's role as a global cultural capital through to 2036.

The Cultural Policy informs a unified and collaborative approach across the City of Adelaide and its subsidiaries in valuing, protecting, championing, and promoting the city's unique character, identity, history, creativity, cultural life and communities. It guides strategic investment in infrastructure, funding programs, partnerships, resources, events, initiatives and activities.

A discussion paper, <u>Culture: The Life of Our City</u>, was developed in 2024 to encourage conversation and feedback from a broad cross-section of the community.

Stage 1 Community Consultation:

Highlights of the **Stage 1 community consultation** activities held between November 2024 and March 2025 include:

- 200 total attendees across the Live Music Forum and Culture: The Life of the City Forum
- 226 people listened to at community drop-in sessions at City of Adelaide venues including Adelaide Town Hall, Adelaide Central Markets, ART POD, libraries and community centres.
- 11 submissions and community meetings documented.
- 5 advisory groups and subsidiaries engaged.
- 675 community survey responses received online.

Through this engagement the community identified the following strengths that define Adelaide's unique character and liveability which informed the development of the draft Policy.

- Cultural experiences for everyone.
- Festivals and celebrations.
- Outdoor experiences.
- · Nightlife and live music venues.
- Built heritage and memorials.
- Diversity of traditions and expressions.
- Public art, sculptures, and murals.
- Community connections and belonging.
- Nature connected experiences.
- Pedestrian friendly and city layout.

- Central Market and food culture.
- First Nations culture visibility in the life of the city.
- Street level culture (food trucks, resident and neighbourhood activities, precinct events)

Stage 2 Community Consultation and Responses

Stage 2 of community consultation on the Draft Cultural Policy opened on 9 April and closed on the 30 April 2025.

During the 21 days consultation period:

- 25 Our Adelaide community survey responses were received online and 9 email submissions
- 582 Our Adelaide visits. 66 of these visits (11%) from social media platforms like Facebook and LinkedIn.
- 241 draft Cultural Policy downloads via Our Adelaide.

The key themes arising from the Stage 2 of community consultation confirm that the Draft Cultural Policy is broadly endorsed for its principles and priorities and that the community recognises this policy as an important foundation for the organisation and the city's cultural life over the next decade.

Despite the strong support for its principles including cultural inclusion, there is an underlying tension between different community perspectives and a perceived cultural prioritisation, emphasising the importance of clearly articulating the city's equity responsibilities in respect to cultural rights as part of the Cultural Policy. Community feedback also highlighted a need to more explicitly reference the impact of the digital world in our city's future and Council's role in this space.

The consultation also highlighted that the community expects:

- More concrete actions and resourcing commitments.
- Stronger partnerships, particularly with education, hospitality, and festival organisations for the delivery and evaluation of the policy.
- Transparent funding models to support the long-term success of the city's cultural life.
- Increased and sustained practical measures to support a thriving live music eco-system and enable the viability of venues and artists.

Amendments to the draft Cultural Policy:

- Clarification that the Cultural Policy Principles hold equal value and are applied without any hierarchical ranking or order of importance, acknowledging that the city's cultural life is complex, dynamic and interconnected.
- Additional glossary references to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and disability to reinforce clarity and inclusivity of terminology


used. The definition of Cultural Infrastructure has been revised to highlight festivals as spaces that support art, culture, and community engagement.

- Revision to the role *Partner* under the Policy Principle *Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected* to broaden Council's role advocating for transport improvements beyond public transport to enhance access to culture and support sector workers. Under this principle, an additional reference to Council's role enabling equitable access to digital tools and platforms, and ensuring that digital innovation supports cultural diversity, equity and inclusion, has been included.
- The principle *Preserving Cultural Heritage, Embracing Progress* has been revised to better highlight that festivals are a central part of Adelaide's intangible cultural heritage.
- Inclusion of an explicit reference to public art under the Policy Principle Creating Space for Cultural Expression to more clearly highlight its central role in the vibrancy, liveability and global profile of the city. The revised version of this principle also highlights Council's intent to streamline planning, licensing and public space use processes to support integration of creativity and culture into all aspects of city life, infrastructure and initiatives.
- Universities have been included as collaborators in the evaluation of the Cultural Policy alongside capital city councils, the Australian Local Government Association, and State and Federal Governments.
- Additional glossary definitions and revisions were made to improve inclusivity and clarity, including the addition of a definition for disability and an expanded definition of cultural infrastructure.
- Strengthened commitments across principles to inclusive practice, including the explicit inclusion of public art and activation of underutilised spaces, improved digital and transport access, and expanded language around cultural diversity.
- Universities have been included as collaborators in the evaluation of the Cultural Policy alongside capital city councils, the Australian Local Government Association, and State and Federal Governments.
- The review cycle of the Cultural Policy has been revised from five to four years to enhance responsiveness to changing conditions and community needs.
- A new governance and evaluation section has been included to guide policy implementation, resource allocation and progress tracking, with

alignment to national cultural benchmarks and good practice.

• The Application section has been revised to clarify that implementation will be embedded across entirety of Council operations, work plans, budgets, and subsidiaries, with an emphasis on measurable actions and appropriate resourcing.



Summary of community consultation – 11 Written Submissions

Summary of Submission Renew Adelaide Head of Partnerships and Operations, Timothea Moylan

- I work in the city and am a frequent city visitor.
- I strongly agree with the principles and priorities laid out in the Draft Cultural Policy.
- Overall, I wholeheartedly support the direction this policy is taking and can see that extensive work has been done to understand community sentiments and needs. However I don't feel anything new or action-focused is really being expressed. How will these priorities will be achieved? I realise that this is a draft document intended to inform future strategy, but I think some insight into the intended how of it all would make this feel more meaningful.
- It's fantastic to see that "Creating Space for Cultural Expression" is one of the principles – this is absolutely vital, as Adelaide currently struggles with a lack of independently run creative community spaces. I think the vision of Adelaide as "Australia's cultural and creative capital" is a pretty lofty one unless this is addressed.
- There are two key parts to this access to space, and access to funding. I feel that COA funding for arts projects used to be fairly robust, but has been limited in recent years and tends to be events-focused. This is great in the short-term, but doesn't support the longer-term success of our City's creative ventures. To ensure we see more grassroots creative activity on our streets, it'd be wonderful to see funding programs that directly support the establishment and continued success of new, independent, artist-run spaces à la Summertown Studio, Closer Record Store, Ern Malley or (once upon a time) Format or Reading Room. This

could be achieved in collaboration with organisations like Renew Adelaide, which can assist with access to space.

- Also I'm concerned that Under 25s (a key creative demographic and important voice in our arts community) comprised only 6.5% of responses. I understand this is a tricky demographic to engage, but other than the Neo community workshop, how was direct engagement attempted? Was connecting with TAFE, universities or youth platforms a possibility? The 63% of respondents in the 40 74 age bracket were always far more likely to have engaged with the feedback method / branding and Council-run survey locations than young people. This feels like a bit of an oversight.
- Regardless, I feel this is all on the right track and is a great start. I'm excited to see where it leads and to be involved where I can.

As part of the initial stage of community consultation for the development of the policy the City of Adelaide engaged with the following organisations and education institutions to ensure that the needs of people under 25 years old were considered:

Alongside these industry engagements, The City of Adelaide spoke directly with **21** teens (13–17-year-olds) at the community pop-up session organised with the Art Gallery of South Australia as part of the Neo Hot House Teen Event at the Adelaide Botanic Gardens.

These direct in person engagements were complemented by **43** community survey responses from people under 25 years of age.

- The role of the AHA|SA is to represent and protect the commercial interests of hoteliers throughout South Australia, as such we welcome the opportunity to provide feedback on the Draft Cultural Policy. Pubs, hotels and hospitality venues are not only economic contributors—they are also integral to the city's social and cultural fabric. Hospitality venues within the Adelaide CBD host live music and community events, operate in many heritage-listed buildings, and provide inclusive spaces for a diverse range of patrons.
- The AHA|SA provides the following feedback on the five principles outlined in the Draft Cultural Policy:

PRINCIPLE: Amplifying Our Creative Capital

 The AHA|SA supports the City of Adelaide's aspiration to become Australia's cultural and creative capital. This direction aligns well with our sector's long-standing involvement in supporting live music, festivals and local talent. This goal provides great potential to boost tourism and city vibrancy, which in turn benefits hospitality businesses.

PRINCIPLE: Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected

• The AHA|SA supports the emphasis on inclusivity, as it reflects the social role that hospitality venues already play in Adelaide. Hospitality venues naturally support diverse communities, and the AHA|SA believes that venues are well placed to partner with the City of Adelaide in inclusive programming and precinct activation. Public transport improvements, especially after dark, would also significantly benefit night-time trade and venue safety. However, we encourage the City of Adelaide to be mindful that affordability expectations are not unduly shifted onto private operators without adequate support or incentive programs.

PRINCIPLE: Reconciliation and Truth Telling

• The AHA|SA supports the inclusion of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices in shaping the city's cultural identity.

The Policy Principle "Amplifying our Creative Capital" highlights Council's role driving Adelaide's growth as a cultural tourism destination and creative capital through strategic planning and leveraging relationships with businesses among other organisations to invest in the creative sector.

The Policy Principle "Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected" stresses Council's role in developing, facilitating, and supporting affordable, accessible and community-led cultural experiences for City of Adelaide venues, public spaces, neighbourhoods, precincts, and throughout the Adelaide Park Lands. It also highlights its role advocating for transport improvements that enhance access to culture and support sector workers.

The Policy Principle "Reconciliation and Truth Telling" outlines Council's role in showcasing, celebrating and amplifying Kaurna and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and connection to Country to protect and respect self-determination and cultural heritage.

The Policy Principle "Preserving Cultural Heritage, Embracing Progress" outline's Council's role advocating for the value of Adelaide's heritage locally and internationally to influence policies and attract investment among the levers to safeguard Adelaide's built heritage.

The Policy Principle "Creating Space for Cultural Expression" outlines Council's role facilitating, supporting, and delivering diverse and safe cultural experiences year-round in partnership with government, the private and cultural sectors and community, balancing small and large-

- Festival City Adelaide welcomes the City of Adelaide's commitment to culture as a central pillar in shaping the future of our city. We support the ambition outlined in the Cultural Policy 2025–2036 and, on behalf of our members, offer the following feedback to further strengthen its vision and outcomes.
- 1. Recognise and Amplify Our Festivals as Adelaide's Defining Cultural Identity While the Policy references Adelaide's international designations, it has the opportunity to more fully embrace and leverage our globally unique position as a city of year-round festivals. The "Festival Capital" title is not only symbolic it's a competitive advantage that should be foregrounded in cultural diplomacy, tourism, and economic development strategies. Elevating festivals as cornerstone institutions (albeit ephemeral) alongside galleries, museums and cultural precincts ensures they are resourced, valued, and embedded in the city's long-term vision.

Recommendation:

- Formally position festivals as enduring cultural infrastructure within the policy.
- Reference intended investment in the sustainability and global promotion of festivals as Adelaide's major cultural, social, and economic asset.
- 2. Position Festivals as Cultural Heritage

Revised.

As part of the Cultural Policy context, the City of Adelaide recognises that our world-class festivals are a central part of our reputation as a Creative City and as South Australia's civic and cultural heart.

The definition of Cultural Infrastructure in the glossary section of the policy has been **revised** to highlight festivals as spaces that support art, culture, and community engagement.

As outlined in the Application section of the Cultural Policy, "The principles and priorities of the Cultural Policy 2025-2036 will be reflected in and enabled by strategies, operations, budgets and work plans across the organisation, including subsidiaries of Council. This cohesive and considered approach represents an efficient, effective and economical use of public resources through annual business plans and budget processes."

The Cultural Policy sets out core principles that affirm the inherent value and importance of culture, creativity and community to our city's distinctive identity and future prosperity. The Policy Principle "Creating Space for Cultural

The longevity of many of Adelaide's major festivals, such as Adelaide
Festival and Adelaide Fringe (both est. 1960) and WOMADelaide (est.
1992), has created generational impact and deep community memory.
These festivals should be recognised as part of Adelaide's intangible
cultural heritage, not only for their artistic value, but for their role in
shaping the social and cultural fabric of the city.

Recommendation: **Embed festivals within heritage frameworks** as vital expressions of both historical and contemporary identity.

3. Collaborate to Stimulate the Festival and Cultural Workforce To deliver on the ambition of hosting globally significant events and maintaining Adelaide's high-quality festival experience for locals and visitors alike, policy attention to workforce development is essential, beyond artists and creatives. The City of Adelaide should partner with relevant bodies and state government to attract, retain, and upskill talent.

Recommendation: Partner to deliver workforce and professional development solutions to support a growing and thriving cultural economy.

4. Create Australia's Most Event-Friendly City Many festivals and cultural events encounter persistent barriers in navigating red tape and bureaucratic challenges, including but not limited to approvals, excessive compliance, and access to public space. A flexible, responsive regulatory environment is essential for creativity to flourish.

Recommendation: Express intent to streamline planning, licensing, and public space use processes to better enable cultural activations of all sizes.

5. Long Term and Viable Access to Cultural Infrastructure for the Sector The festival sector — and the arts and cultural sector more broadly — requires secure, contemporary, and sustainable infrastructure to thrive. This includes access to rehearsal spaces, office hubs, storage, digital and

Expression" highlights Council's role promoting, celebrating and elevating Adelaide's cultural life to enhance access to cultural experiences and opportunities and attract new audiences and investment. References to the Council's intended investment in sustainability and global promotion activities for specific cultural infrastructure are outside of the scope of this policy.

The Policy Principle "Preserving Cultural Heritage, Embracing Progress" has been **revised** to more clearly articulate that through the implementation of this policy Council will advocate for the value of Adelaide's heritage locally and internationally to influence policies and attract investment to safeguard Adelaide's festivals.

The definition of heritage provided in the glossary section of the Cultural Policy is inclusive of both tangible and intangible cultural and natural heritage and recognises the role of significant cultural and natural assets in shaping historical, social and environmental elements of the city.

The Policy Principle "Amplifying our Creative Capital" highlights Council's commitment to nurturing creative careers and sector growth and supporting talent retention through partnerships and co-investment. The principle is reflected in the priority "Drive Adelaide's growth as cultural tourism destination and creative capital through strategic planning and leveraging relationships with universities, business, and organisations to invest in creative sector growth".

The Policy Principle "Creating Space for Cultural Expression" has been **revised** to more explicitly highlight intent to streamline planning, licensing and public space use processes to support integration of creativity and

physical presentation and performance infrastructure. Ensuring long-term, equitable access to cultural spaces across the public, private and independent sectors must be a priority.

Recommendation: Expand intention around investment in adaptable, fit-for-purpose cultural infrastructure that is affordable and accessible to the festival and event sector (arts sector more broadly).

We commend the City of Adelaide for its bold cultural vision. By strengthening the policy in recognition of festivals as dynamic, historical and future-facing cultural infrastructure, Adelaide can ensure that its identity as a global creative capital is not only celebrated — but sustained.

- The University of Adelaide and The University of South Australia, who in January 2026 will formally become Adelaide University, welcome the opportunity to provide input on the City of Adelaide's Draft Cultural Policy. There is a strong connection between the principles and priorities outlined in the Draft Cultural Policy, and the mission of Adelaide University.
- Adelaide University will be a cultural anchor institution one that delivers programs and events, but that also contributes to policy outcomes through education, workforce development and thought leadership. Adelaide University's focus on arts, creativity and culture (based on the successes of its foundation universities) include the university-wide Creative & Cultural Signature Research Theme, the International and External Engagement Portfolio, the College of Creative Arts, Design and Humanities, and our public-facing cultural institutions in the City of Adelaide: Samstag Museum of Art, MOD. (Museum of Discovery), Bob Hawke Prime Ministerial Centre, Elder Conservatorium of Music. Adelaide University will continue to provide a strong platform for arts, creativity and culture, with enhanced global connections, and community and regional engagement, driving sustainable development of the creative economies and cultural industries of the City of Adelaide. In doing so, Adelaide University will be an institution that shapes society, preserves cultural heritage, enriches public understanding, and builds deep and enduring connections that drive lasting societal impact.

The Policy Principle "Amplifying our Creative Capital" highlights the importance of strategic planning and leveraging relationships with universities, businesses, and organisations to invest in creative sector growth and grow Adelaide as a Cultural and Creative Capital. It also explicitly outlines international exchange and collaboration as a priority area for the policy.

The Policy Principle "Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected" has been **revised** to more explicitly outline Council's role in enabling equitable access to digital tools and platforms and ensuring that digital innovation supports cultural diversity, equity and inclusion. In addition, the cultural infrastructure definition in the Cultural Policy's Glossary, refers to the digital spaces that support art, culture and community engagement including the digital platforms that expand cultural access.

The Evaluation section of the policy has been **revised** to include universities as evaluation collaborators alongside

 The feedback below aligns with the proposed principles, offering suggestions to strengthen the document and support the City of Adelaide's long-term cultural vision.

Principle 1: Amplifying our creative capital

- Leveraging existing initiatives for strategic cultural growth Building on planned Adelaide University initiatives and its cultural institutions will strengthen efforts in this area. We will deliver an annual program of impactful campus and cultural events, including university-wide events such as Open Day, Reconciliation Week events, collaborative community festivals, and strategic partnerships with external partners, such as Tasting Australia, that position the University as an active and valued contributor to the state's creative and cultural life. These efforts directly reflect the Cultural Policy's emphasis on place-making, participatory arts, and accessible experiences across the city and state, and include opportunities. This will include contributing to cultural infrastructure and precinct activation in the City of Adelaide through exhibitions and use of spaces on our campuses. The University's volunteer programs will activate civic participation, with thousands of volunteers providing an integral link between the University and the wider community. Within the Creative & Cultural Signature Research Theme, the planned program areas Imagine Adelaide and the South Australian Cultural Exchange would provide effective frameworks for cultural development and collaboration. These programs and platforms offer opportunities for strategic alignment, co-support and broader sector engagement, allowing the City to enhance its impact through shared resources and expertise.
- Alignment with UNESCO Creative Cities mission
 The focus on the UNESCO City of Music designation is a positive inclusion.
 This City designation should be exploited more, however, and it would be useful to see more detail on how this is going to be achieved. With the right administration and project support, the UNESCO City of Music could become something genuinely meaningful positioning Adelaide as a global centre of excellence in music. Compared to other 'Cities of Music',

capital city councils, the Australian Local Government Association, and State and Federal Governments.

the title is far less visible here in Adelaide and should be used not only to support international touring but also to energise what we are doing here on the ground. Some **further clarity on what this 'amplification' looks like would be welcomed**. In addition, the broader UNESCO Creative Cities network could be much better leveraged. As above, there is a strong opportunity here to collaborate with Adelaide University's Creative & Cultural Signature Research Theme, as well as its new College of Creative Arts, Design and Humanities (incorporating the Elder Conservatorium).

• Technology in creative practice There is limited mention of technology in relation to creativity. This appears to be a significant gap, considering how many creatives we have in Adelaide in this space, and the resources already available within the State – e.g., Immersive Light and Art. Adelaide University will also be home to a world-leading centre for interactive and virtual environments, incorporating creative arts approaches to technology, and we welcome the opportunity to collaborate.

Principle 2: Creating space for cultural expression

- Integrating international engagement into cultural policy and levering current institutions
- We welcome the alignment with the recently released SA Government cultural policy, as well as the Federal Government's National Cultural Policy, Revive, which provide a comprehensive framework for collaborative approach across all levels of government. The University sees this as an opportunity to align institutional assets—physical, intellectual, and cultural—with public policy priorities that celebrate creativity, expand access, and support the development of a thriving, sustainable creative sector in South Australia.
- Adding a clear reference to international engagement would strengthen
 this principle. Adelaide's cultural institutions and universities already benefit
 significantly from global networks, forums and partnerships. It would be
 beneficial for sustainable development in the longer term to envision a
 cultural policy deeply connected to international networks. The Creative &

Cultural Signature Research Theme and its plans for global exchange (e.g., thought leaders in residence) align with this principle and could provide opportunities for enhanced international engagement. Strong international engagement could also be leveraged through partnerships with Adelaide University's cultural institutions (Elder Conservatorium, Samstag, MOD., Hawke Centre), who already have enviable connections with internationally significant artists, cultural producers and thought leaders.

- Our long-standing partnership with the <u>Helpmann Academy</u> also presents an opportunity to enhance the City's cultural infrastructure by fostering meaningful connections, supporting emerging creative practitioners, and amplifying diverse cultural expressions. There is scope to take the work of the Helpmann Academy even further, for example through shared space in the City to promote Adelaide's best up-and-coming creative talent.
- Increased support for live music venues and acts
 Adelaide University would welcome inclusion of increased and
 sustained practical measures that support a thriving live music ecosystem and genuinely enables the viability of venues and artists. This
 might include investment in places and spaces, both indoor and outdoor, to
 support emerging and established talent to showcase their work and
 continue to practice their craft. The City's West End, close to Adelaide
 University's main creative and cultural teaching precinct, provides an ideal
 location for investment in live music (and other arts) venues, building a
 thriving culture and scene. Adelaide University has researchers working on
 the topic of the live music ecosystem and would welcome an opportunity
 for collaboration. In addition, the university's partnership with the
 Helpmann Academy provides another opportunity for leveraging existing
 organisations and activities to scale opportunities for emerging music (and
 other arts) talent.

Principle 3: Culturally inclusive and socially connected Access to creative spaces for young people

 There is a valuable opportunity here to strengthen the connection between Council and Adelaide University, namely through the new Community and

Regional Engagement portfolio within Adelaide University's International & External Engagement portfolio, particularly through partnerships and events with cultural institutions such as the Children's University Adelaide, Samstag and MOD., who already run successful arts and cultural programs with young people. We welcome the opportunity for more coordinated efforts to scale the work we do with young people, particularly for future impact and leadership.

Principle 4: Evaluation process

Including universities as collaborators in the evaluation process –
from initial evaluation framework design – would be a valuable addition to
the policy. This may be part of, or in addition to, a formal Advisory Board
overseeing the implementation of the cultural policy. With its Creative &
Cultural Signature Research Theme, and the new College of Creative Arts,
Design and Humanities, Adelaide University is well placed to provide
independent and evidence-based evaluation of the policy and
implementation, and is keen to contribute where it can in order to bolster
the efforts and reputation of the City of Adelaide.

 Adelaide University congratulates Adelaide City Council on its draft Cultural Policy, and we look forward to opportunities where we can further contribute to growing the reputation of Adelaide as one of the world's premier artistic, cultural and creative cities. We are keen to be part of relevant working parties and committees that may be set up to help realise the ambitions of the City's creative and cultural footprint.

Firstly I think it would be good to include the **d/Deaf community** in the 'culturally inclusive socially connected' portion, as **Deafness is an identity outside of disability**. A potential way to put this could be:

- d/Deaf and disabled people or
- the d/Deaf community separate from people living with disabilities.

Secondly, I would like to see the policy focus on increasing access to cultural events for **people living with intellectual disabilities** specifically. They are the most excluded demographic of people in general and because of the broadness of 'people living with disabilities,' policies like this are still not inclusive of them (as people can meet accessibility requirements through accommodating for physical/less profound psychosocial disabilities without even considering people with profound intellectual disabilities). South Australian Council for Intellectual Disability is an amazing organisation that I hope the City of Adelaide has already consulted with. If not, I highly recommend them as they are peer informed and offer a range of services.

Congratulations on getting to this point of the policy! It looks very promising and I am excited to see it come to fruition.

I am very passionate about both art and disability and am very aware of the lack of accessibility for profoundly disabled people to participate in arts and cultural events.

A representative from the Multicultural Commission has submitted a comprehensive response to help inform the development and refinement of the draft Cultural Policy. In addition, ongoing consultation and engagement with the South Australian Multicultural Commission (SAMC) will continue. As an organisational framework, the Cultural Policy embeds principles that support ongoing collaboration with the key communities advisory and representative

Multicultural Affairs also strengthens our multicultural community organisations and showcases who we are as proud multicultural South Australians. In addition, Multicultural Affairs provides policy and executive support to the South Australian Multicultural Commission, which is a statutory body that reports to me.

The South Australian Multicultural Charter

Include the South Australian Multicultural Charter among the useful documents listed within the City of Adelaide Cultural Policy.

On 9 March 2023, I was honoured to join our Premier, the Hon Peter Malinauskas MP, to launch the first South Australian Multicultural Charter. The Charter was prescribed by the *South Australian Multicultural Act 2021*. It acknowledges our state's culturally diverse history and includes six principles to promote a unified, harmonious, and inclusive South Australian community that values, respects and supports diversity. It provides guidance to South Australian government agencies, organisations, institutions, businesses and communities and is a foundation for all South Australian service delivery, policy and program development, by placing cultural diversity at the heart of decision making.

The Multicultural South Australia Ambassador Program

groups such as the SAMC and community groups on a variety of matters and plans affecting the City of Adelaide, with the aim of creating a more inclusive and diverse experience of the city.

The Cultural Policy demonstrates a clear commitment to cultural equity and sector growth by supporting culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) artists and creatives. particularly those who are independent or emerging. Under the principle Amplifying Our Creative Capital, the policy commits to "support local creatives of all backgrounds, abilities and stages of practice, and nurture cultural jobs and professions through showcasing and employment opportunities." CALD communities are also identified as a priority population under the Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected principle. Additionally, the City outlines its role in "collaborating with the sector and other levels of government to build capacity and capability in the cultural sector." The policy recognises that the City of Adelaide is part of a broader cultural ecosystem and notes its intent to work with state and federal partners to deliver initiatives that reduce access barriers and strengthen support for underrepresented creatives.

The South Australian Multicultural Charter has been added to the list of documents and relevant reading in the Cultural Policy.

The Policy acknowledges the importance of equitable access to cultural spaces, particularly under the revised *Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected* principle. Recent updates include commitments to "support community-led cultural experiences in City venues and public spaces" and to "develop, facilitate and support affordable, accessible and community-led cultural

I am committed to encouraging South Australian organisations of all sizes and sectors, including local councils, to embed the South Australian Multicultural Charter's principles in their workforces, policies and service delivery. That is why I launched the Multicultural South Australia Ambassador Program in November 2023. The program includes tailored support, networking opportunities, and group training to empower organisations to make their workplaces more culturally responsive and inclusive, cementing their reputations as leaders and role models in our community.

The Ambassador Program commenced as a six-month pilot, with five leading South Australian organisations, now known as our Foundation Members. We then scaled up the program to include ten diverse South Australian organisations, that have created bespoke Action Plans to activate the Multicultural Charter within their organisations. Two Local Councils have participated in the Ambassador Program so far, including the City of West Torrens (a Foundation Member), and the Rural City of Murray Bridge. I invite the City of Adelaide to consider submitting an Expression of Interest to participate in one of the upcoming rounds of the Ambassador Program, either from June to November 2025, or January to June 2026.

Multicultural communities' access to facilities

Make the city's cultural infrastructure more accessible to multicultural community organisations and groups to create space for cultural expression. Community facilities deliver valuable social and cultural outcomes, providing safe and welcoming spaces for community members of all ages and backgrounds to gather and interact, reducing social isolation and strengthening community connections and wellbeing.

Many of our European migrant communities that arrived in South Australia during or just after World War 2 were fortunate enough to be able to purchase - at minimal cost- land and/or buildings to establish their community centres, and to grow their assets

experiences year-round," with CALD communities identified as a priority group. While these revisions reflect inclusive intent, the policy only partially addresses the practical barriers faced by multicultural communities. Implementation presents opportunities to strengthen this further through actions such as reviewing hire fee structures, forming partnerships, and addressing infrastructure access disparities for newer migrant communities.

This was an immense financial gain for these early migrant communities and it continues to benefit them today, with many now owning and operating private health facilities, education institutions and rental premises. The financial growth of these communities has resulted in further long-term economic benefits and strengths to the state, either through investments, infrastructure, the tourism sector, and hosting large festivals and events.

However, migrant communities that arrived in South Australia in the last 25 years have not had the same property and financial advantages. In fact, they are unlikely to ever enjoy the same physical and economic assets of our earlier migrant communities.

For these groups, being able to access affordable community facilities is of great importance, to help them promote community connections and wellbeing, and for cultural expression.

I have heard from the South Australian Multicultural Commission, and from communities directly, about the scarcity of shared multi-purpose local government facilities, and that some cannot accommodate required safe spaces or support cultural practices (such as prayer rooms).

I encourage the City of Adelaide to consider ways to make cultural infrastructure more affordable and accessible to our multicultural community organisations and groups, including by waiving or reducing hire fees and pursuing partnerships.

Expand support for culturally and linguistically diverse artists and creatives

Explore opportunities to support independent artists and creatives from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds through grants and other funding.

South Australia has a well-deserved reputation as an arts and festival state, and Adelaide is Australia's first and only UNESCO Creative City of Music.

Our great state is home to incredible artists and creatives working across various forms. However, independent artists from migrant and refugee backgrounds can face additional barriers to developing their practice or

exhibiting their work, because most grants programs administered by local, state and federal governments require applicants to be professional artists with proven track records of creative achievement. These criteria are especially hard to meet for new arrivals to our state.

Noting your Cultural Policy priority to support cultural jobs and creative careers, I encourage the City of Adelaide to continue working with CreateSA (formerly Arts South Australia) and other stakeholders to explore opportunities to support independent artists and creatives from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds through grants and other funding

Arts Industry Council of SA

The Arts Industry Council SA (AICSA) is a non-government not-for-profit acting as an independent voice for the arts in SA. Run by a volunteer Executive Committee and part-time General Manager, AICSA acts on behalf of its members to advocate for a strong future for South Australian artists, arts workers and arts organisations.

We are pleased to see City of Adelaide's recent consultation on the Draft Cultural policy, and further understand that City of Adelaide aims to be Australia's cultural and creative capital by nurturing careers and sector growth and supporting talent retention, through partnerships and coinvestment.

Fundamentally it is essential that Councillors and administration staff alike are aware of the value arts and culture bring to a vibrant and safe city and the need for increased arts engagement and opportunities within their policies and procedures and we applaud the consultation and development work the City of Adelaide has done to develop and deliver this.

Here we respond to the draft cultural policy and its five principles of:

- Amplifying Our Creative Capital
- Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected
- Reconciliation and Truth-Telling
- Preserving Cultural Heritage, Embracing Progress

Revised

The Cultural Policy affirms the City's ambition to be Australia's cultural and creative capital by integrating culture into economic development, employment, urban planning, and social wellbeing—aligning closely with AICSA's call for stronger recognition of the arts' civic value. Under the Amplifying Our Creative Capital principle, the City commits to supporting cultural jobs and creative careers through partnerships and co-investment. The Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected principle reflects equity priorities by identifying young people, CALD communities, LGBTQIA+ people, people with disabilities, women, and older people as priority groups, and emphasising inclusive access and affordability. The policy also strongly supports Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander self-determination through the Reconciliation and Truth-Telling principle, addressing language, cultural revitalisation, and Kaurna leadership in public art and design. The Policy treats all five principles as interdependent and equally important.

• Creating Space for Cultural Expression

We suggest a reordering of the five principles. We hope that Reconciliation and Truth-Telling will be at the centre of the policy and would be in fact the first priority above all others. The arts sector as a whole plays an important role in supporting First Nations rights, including reconciliation and truth-telling. In addition to this, we argue that the final priority of Creating Space for Cultural Expressions is the most pressing and urgent aspect of the policy.

We recognise that "creating space" refers to both physical spaces as well as creating the conditions for art-making to occur. Many discussions with our membership have recently highlighted limited access to spaces to create, including live music and performance venues, rehearsal spaces and independent galleries and multi purpose arts spaces. These facilities are limited statewide but especially in the Adelaide CBD. This is highlighted by many urban hubs delivering year round activations in metro Adelaide, (eg. Goodwood Theatre, Warehouse Theatre in Unley, Shedley Theatre in Elizabeth) whilst independent venues within the CBD are rapidly declining, with the recent closures of The Bakehouse Theatre. Prompt Creative. Hades Hula House, My Lover Cindi, along with many others, and with other organisations seeking new offices outside the CBD. We argue this diminishes the cultural ecosystem of the city of Adelaide and the state of South Australia. Artists and creatives no longer have access to affordable venues to present and create work in. We believe more can be done to increase capacity for arts and cultural institutions and independent artists to present work within the City of Adelaide.

As part of the Cultural Policy feedback we encourage an audit on access for both artists and audiences in large and small scale venue infrastructure within the City of Adelaide, and increased investment in the operation of these businesses knowing they can not compete on commercial lease agreements.

We would also suggest that there is a need to highlight another priority, or to rethink Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected principle, to better prioritise issues of access, diversity and inclusion in the policy. We acknowledge the policy has benefited from an inclusive advisory panel, we recommend

The Policy provides a strong foundation for the City of Adelaide to address key gaps and enhance cultural access and sector support. Under the *Creating Space for Cultural Expression* principle, revised wording strengthens the City's commitment to "expand cultural infrastructure, including activating underutilised spaces and supporting affordable, inclusive access to venues, facilities, and public places." This opens opportunities for future initiatives or organisational activities such as venue audits, support for non-commercial spaces, and access constraints for creatives. While implementation details are still to come, the policy's focus on developing clear deliverables and measurable actions will provide a framework to guide funding, timelines, and community-led priorities.

The Policy responds to AICSA's call for stronger inclusion by identifying young people, older people, people with disabilities, CALD communities, women, and LGBTQIA+ people as priority groups under the *Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected* principle. It commits to integrating intersectionality, equity, and inclusivity into cultural planning and supporting community-led cultural experiences. these revisions reflect inclusive intent, development in implementation to ensure deeper engagement—such as through co-design processes, shared decision-making, and representation in governance and funding outcomes.

The City of Adelaide will further engage with the AICSA on future opportunities, collaborations and partnerships.

highlighting the intersectionalities of our community and the important role, young people, older people, people living with disabilities, culturally and linguistically diverse communities, women; and LGBTQIA+ communities play within the five guiding principles and how this will shape the cultural policy and its implementation. It is essential to look deeper than participation and access to ensure communities are deeply engaged in delivery, in choices, opportunities and funding outcomes. Our recommendation is to further develop these outcomes and opportunities with a sharper focus on community needs and marginalised voices ensuring representation at all levels or engagement.

We look forward to further understanding and collaboration in regard to actions that will take place against this plan as there is limited information shared around how the objectives will be achieved.

This submission critically analyses the City of Adelaide's draft Cultural Policy 2025-2036 from the perspective of the Multicultural Communities Council of South Australia (MCCSA), focusing on accessibility, inclusion, and multicultural representation within Adelaide's cultural landscape. As a committee member with lived experience of cerebral palsy and a professional background in disability and developmental education, I bring intersectional insights to this review.

The draft Cultural Policy establishes a foundation for Adelaide's cultural future through its commitment to universal human rights principles and recognition of diverse communities. However, to deliver on its vision of Adelaide as "Australia's cultural and creative capital," the policy must transform symbolic recognition into structural inclusion and community empowerment.

This submission identifies specific recommendations supported by contemporary research, population data, and emerging best practices. These recommendations will strengthen the policy's practical application and ensure Adelaide's cultural ecosystem genuinely reflects and includes its diverse

Revised

The revised Cultural Policy shows clear progress in global framing and multicultural recognition. It emphasises Adelaide's role as a "global cultural capital," strengthens references to international, national, and local networks, and explicitly acknowledges culturally and linguistically diverse communities, including migrants and refugees. The glossary now defines culture to include "diverse identities shaped by migration and history," and the policy formally recognises the *South Australian Multicultural Charter* (2021), reinforcing alignment with inclusive state frameworks. While the policy does not directly address current geopolitical shifts, this reflects its intent as a highlevel, principle-driven document designed to ensure long-term relevance and adaptability.

The Cultural Policy demonstrates a strong alignment with the principles of inclusion, equity, and diversity, reflecting many of the values articulated in the South Australian

population - particularly those at the intersection of cultural diversity and disability.

1. Acknowledging the Draft Policy's Strengths

The draft Cultural Policy 2025-2036 demonstrates several strengths:

Ethical foundation:

The policy grounds itself in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and commits to equitable cultural participation, providing a solid ethical framework (p. 3).

Recognition of priority groups:

The explicit acknowledgment of 'people living with disabilities' and 'culturally and linguistically diverse communities' as focus populations signals an awareness of the historical barriers these groups have faced in participating fully.

Holistic cultural vision:

The policy articulates a comprehensive understanding of culture spanning traditional forms (heritage, storytelling, food) and contemporary expressions (digital platforms, music, design).

Strategic alignment:

The policy connects with key frameworks, including the City of Adelaide Disability, Access and Inclusion Plan 2024-2028, Stretch Reconciliation Action Plan 2024-2027, and South Australian Multicultural Act 2021.

UNESCO Creative Cities Network:

The policy leverages Adelaide's designation as Australia's only UNESCO Creative City of Music to drive international engagement and cultural development.

These elements create a foundation for a genuinely inclusive cultural policy that better serves all Adelaide residents.

Multicultural Charter—particularly through its focus on cultural accessibility, support for culturally and linguistically diverse communities, and a clear commitment to social connection and reconciliation. However, the policy does not explicitly reference the Charter or formally align its principles within the framework as the policy is a high-level, principle-driven document that aligns with multiple strategic frameworks—international (e.g., UNESCO), national (e.g., Revive: National Cultural Policy), and state-based (A Place to Create)—without privileging or directly citing any single one and to maintain flexibility and avoid overcommitment to one policy lens. While the Cultural Policy does reference the South Australian Multicultural Act 2021, which contains the Charter, and the Charter's principles are embedded by implication rather than requiring explicit inclusion.

The revised Cultural Policy introduces a valuable new commitment under the *Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected* section: to "enable equitable access to digital tools and platforms, and ensure that digital innovation supports cultural diversity, equity, and inclusion." Additionally, the glossary now defines cultural infrastructure to include "digital platforms that expand cultural access," acknowledging their growing role in broadening participation. To build on this, relevant action plans and strategies will explore further opportunities to address digital equity—particularly through community-led initiatives delivered via Community Centres and Library programs, as highlighted in community submissions.

While the Cultural Policy 2025–2036 does not establish a dedicated governance framework for cultural equity, it does embed important principles of inclusion, accessibility, and intersectionality throughout its priorities. The policy recognises the importance of community representation

2. Critical Gaps in the Current Draft

While the draft policy demonstrates positive intent, several significant weaknesses undermine its effectiveness as a future-facing document for Adelaide's culturally diverse community:

2.1 Failure to Address Changing Geopolitical and Cultural Landscape

Critical Gap: The draft policy operates in a cultural and geopolitical vacuum, ignoring the rapidly evolving global context within which Adelaide's cultural ecosystem must function. Significant international and regional shifts since 2020 have fundamentally altered migration patterns, diaspora community formations, and intercultural dynamics.

Impact of Omission

- The policy ignores emerging cultural communities from regions experiencing recent conflict, climate displacement, or political instability
- It fails to recognise how geopolitical tensions impact intercultural relations and community cohesion within Adelaide
- It lacks strategies to navigate the impacts of global polarisation on local cultural expression
- It provides no framework for addressing cultural safety concerns for communities experiencing increased vulnerability due to international events

According to the 2021 Census data published by the Australian Bureau of Statistics, South Australia's cultural makeup continues to diversify with emerging communities that weren't present in significant numbers during previous policy development cycles.

The Lowy Institute's Australia in the World poll (2023) demonstrates growing concern about how international conflicts affect community cohesion domestically. (https://poll.lowyinstitute.org/charts/)

and indicates that expert advice and community voices will inform implementation and relevant actions. This will be supported by existing Council advisory structures such as the Access and Inclusion Advisory Panel, the Reconciliation Committee, and the Public Art Round Table, which bring diverse perspectives to cultural planning. These bodies offer a foundation for inclusive governance, and there is an opportunity to further strengthen this by ensuring ongoing CALD representation and culturally diverse leadership are formally embedded in implementation, monitoring, and evaluation processes.

The Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected principle of the Policy commits to ensuring that "all people can contribute, participate and be represented in the cultural life of the city." It explicitly identifies CALD communities including migrants and refugees—as priority populations for access and inclusion. Under this principle, the Council commits to integrating intersectionality, inclusivity, and equity into cultural planning, and to supporting communityled cultural experiences in City venues and public spaces. These are strong starting points that acknowledge the importance of representation and cultural leadership and lay the groundwork for more participatory approaches in Council business, cultural planning and delivery to ensure cultural equity is embedded not just in intention, but in structure and practice. Additionally, inclusion of "culturally safe" access under this principle marks an important recognition of the need for not only physical and economic access, but also emotional and cultural wellbeing in participation. Embedding this reinforces the City's responsibility to foster environments where people of diverse backgrounds feel respected, safe, and empowered in cultural spaces.

2.2 Insufficient Recognition of Digital Transformation in Cultural Expression Critical Gap: Despite references to "digital platforms," the draft policy inadequately addresses how technological transformation revolutionises cultural production, participation, and community formation - particularly for culturally diverse communities maintaining transnational connections.

Impact of Omission:

- Limited acknowledgment of how digital platforms enable diaspora communities to maintain cultural connections
- No strategies for addressing digital divide issues affecting older CALD community members
- Absence of vision for supporting digitally-native cultural expressions from newer migrant communities
- Lack of consideration for how virtual cultural exchange could enhance Adelaide's international cultural profile

The Australian Digital Inclusion Index consistently highlights that CALD communities and people with disability face additional barriers to digital participation. (https://www.digitalinclusionindex.org.au/)

- 2.3 Inadequate Governance Framework for Cultural Equity Critical Gap: The policy lacks a robust governance framework to ensure representation and decision-making power for multicultural communities in ongoing policy implementation and evaluation. Impact of Omission:
- Perpetuation of top-down cultural planning without meaningful, diverse community leadership
- Absence of accountability mechanisms to ensure policy objectives translate into practice
- No commitment to structural representation of CALD communities within cultural governance
- Limited transparency around how cultural investment decisions will be made.
- 3. Detailed Recommendations with Evidence-Based Rationales

Many of the proposed recommendations and initiatives outlined in the feedback and supporting materials offer valuable insight into potential organisational actions that could inform the implementation of the Policy. They are also relevant to several other strategies and action plans, including those focused on intersectional identity frameworks, multicultural and disability awareness training, cultural safety principles and practices, and the delivery of accessible, multilingual, and inclusive programs and training.

3.1 Explicitly Align with the South Australian Multicultural Charter

Recommendation: Directly integrate the South Australian Multicultural Charter's principles throughout the policy framework and implementation strategy rather than merely referencing the Multicultural Act 2021 (p. 6).

Detailed Rationale:

The Charter emphasises fundamental principles that must guide the Cultural Policy:

- Recognition and respect for cultural, linguistic and religious diversity
- Enabling full participation in South Australia's social, cultural, economic and political life
- Equitable access to services regardless of cultural background
- Promotion of mutual respect and understanding among all people

According to 2021 Census data, 27.6% of South Australians were born overseas, with significant concentrations in metropolitan Adelaide. This demographic reality demands robust policy architecture that not only acknowledges diversity but actively enables cultural expression and participation. (https://www.abs.gov.au/statistics/people/people-and-communities/cultural-diversity-census/2021)

The current policy misses an opportunity to demonstrate how charter principles will operate in cultural planning and delivery. Embedding these principles will transform the policy from tokenistic recognition to genuine inclusion.

- Include explicit statements aligning the Cultural Policy with each Charter principle
- Develop specific measurement criteria to evaluate each principle

- Reference the Charter within each of the five policy principles where relevant
- Create accountability mechanisms for reporting on Charter alignment
- 3.2 Strengthen Multicultural Community Engagement Mechanisms

Recommendation: Establish structured pathways for direct multicultural community involvement in cultural governance, planning, programming and evaluation - moving beyond consultation to co-design and co-creation.

Detailed Rationale:

The Australian Human Rights Commission's "Sharing Our Stories" report (2021) identifies "cultural gatekeeping" as a significant barrier to participation, where decisions about cultural programming and investment occur without meaningful input from diverse communities. (https://humanrights.gov.au/ourwork/race-discrimination/publications/sharing-our-stories-guidelines-heritage-and-culture)

The Settlement Council of Australia's "Settlement in Regional Australia" report highlights barriers newly arrived communities face in accessing cultural opportunities. (https://scoa.org.au/publications/)

The City of Adelaide's community profile indicates that over 100 cultural and linguistic groups reside within the council area. Yet, the policy provides no specific mechanisms to ensure their direct involvement in cultural planning and delivery.

- Establish a dedicated CALD Cultural Advisory Group with formal links to Council cultural planning
- Allocate resources for community cultural brokers to facilitate genuine engagement
- Create multilingual consultation processes with accessibility accommodations
- Develop specific pathways for emerging and established multicultural communities

- Implement weighted representation to ensure smaller communities have a meaningful voice
- Resource ethno-specific cultural initiatives through dedicated funding streams
- 3.3 Acknowledge and Address Intersectionality

Recommendation: Embed a comprehensive intersectionality framework throughout the policy that recognises the compound impact of overlapping identities - particularly the intersection of cultural background, language, disability, age, gender, and migration experience.

Detailed Rationale:

The Federation of Ethnic Communities Councils of Australia (FECCA) has produced several reports on the intersection of cultural diversity and disability, including their accessible resources guide, which demonstrates the complexities of addressing these intersecting identities. (https://fecca.org.au/resources/)

The National Ethnic Disability Alliance (NEDA) has documented how people with disability from CALD backgrounds experience "invisibility" within both disability services and cultural community settings. (https://www.neda.org.au/publications)

Current policy language lists these groups rather than acknowledging the unique challenges faced at these intersections.

- Develop an intersectionality audit tool for all cultural programs and venues
- Establish targeted support for people experiencing multiple barriers
- Collect and analyse participation data across intersectional categories
- Create specific programming that addresses compound disadvantage
- Ensure representative diversity among decision-makers and cultural workers
- 3.4 Implement Comprehensive Intercultural Intelligence and Disability Awareness Training

Recommendation: Mandate ongoing intercultural intelligence and disability awareness training for all staff, service providers, funded organisations, and contractors delivering cultural programs and services under the policy.

Detailed Rationale:

Intercultural intelligence (also known as cultural intelligence or CQ) provides essential frameworks for effectively bridging cultural differences in policy implementation. The Commonwealth Government's Australia in the Asian Century White Paper specifically identified intercultural intelligence as a core capability for Australian organisations operating in multicultural contexts. (https://apo.org.au/node/31241)

The Centre for Cultural Diversity in Ageing offers frameworks for intercultural intelligence training specifically designed for the Australian context, emphasising the distinction between cultural awareness (knowledge) and intercultural intelligence (skills and adaptive capabilities). (https://www.culturaldiversity.com.au/training/cultural-intelligence-program)

The National Ethnic Disability Alliance (NEDA) reports that even well-intentioned staff inadvertently create exclusionary environments due to a limited understanding of how culture impacts disability experiences. (https://www.neda.org.au/publications)

The Australian Human Rights Commission provides evidence that training interventions must be continuous rather than one-off to create lasting change in institutional practices. (https://humanrights.gov.au/education/training-resources)

Implementation actions:

 Develop comprehensive intercultural intelligence training covering: Moving beyond cultural awareness to cultural adaptability Intercultural communication strategies across diverse contexts Cultural dimensions of disability

Cultural safety in program design and delivery
Accessible communication across languages and abilities
Migration trauma and its impact on participation

Inclusive practices for public events and exhibitions

- Require training completion before funding allocation
- Include refresher training in funding agreements
- Evaluate training impact through participant feedback and practice change
- Create partnerships with specialised providers such as Diversity Australia and the Australian Intercultural Society to deliver targeted training programs
- Develop train-the-trainer models to build ongoing internal capacity
- 3.5 Foster Cultural Intelligence and Safety

Recommendation: Integrate cultural intelligence (CQ) and cultural safety principles throughout the policy implementation, including program design, venue management, funding criteria, and evaluation frameworks.

Detailed Rationale:

Cultural intelligence research demonstrates that it goes beyond awareness to include adaptive capabilities necessary for genuine inclusion. Cultural safety requires that:

- Organisations use language respectfully
- Staff observe cultural protocols
- Venues respond to community concerns
- Programs create spaces free from judgement or stereotyping

The current policy lacks explicit attention to creating environments where people feel their cultural identity is respected, protected, and welcome.

Implementation actions:

- Develop cultural safety guidelines for all Council cultural venues
- Incorporate cultural intelligence measures in staff performance frameworks
- Train venue managers in cultural safety principles
- Create cultural safety audit tools for funded organisations
- Establish feedback mechanisms for community members to report safety concerns
- Implement consequences for cultural safety breaches by funded organisations
- 3.6 Provide Dedicated Community Cultural Spaces

Recommendation: Allocate physical spaces specifically for multicultural community management and use, providing infrastructure for cultural maintenance, celebration, and exchange.

Detailed Rationale:

The Scanlon Foundation's Mapping Social Cohesion Report regularly examines factors affecting multicultural community cohesion, with community spaces identified as important infrastructure.

Multicultural NSW has documented the importance of dedicated spaces for newer migrant communities who lack established infrastructure and face barriers to accessing mainstream venues.

The current policy contains no specific commitment to physical infrastructure for multicultural communities beyond general statements about cultural infrastructure.

- Audit existing Council-owned spaces for potential community management
- Develop a dedicated multicultural hub with performance, exhibition, and gathering spaces

- Create multilingual community kitchen facilities for food-based cultural activities
- Establish a subsidised access program for community-managed cultural spaces
- Support community ownership models through capacity building and resources
- Develop clear governance frameworks for community-managed cultural spaces
- 3.7 Fund Community-Led Cultural Celebrations

Recommendation: Establish dedicated funding streams for grassroots multicultural events and celebrations, prioritising emerging communities and those with limited access to mainstream resources.

Detailed Rationale:

The Settlement Council of Australia identifies community-led celebrations as critical vehicles for cultural maintenance and intercultural exchange. (https://scoa.org.au/publications/)

Deloitte Access Economics has produced several reports on the economic value of festivals and events, demonstrating their benefit beyond cultural outcomes.

(https://www2.deloitte.com/au/en/pages/economics/topics/economicanalysis.html)

MCCSA data indicates that over 40 significant cultural celebrations occur annually across Adelaide's communities. Yet, many receive minimal or inconsistent support, limiting their reach and sustainability.

- Create a dedicated multicultural celebrations fund with simplified application processes
- Establish multi-year funding agreements for established cultural events

- Provide grants officer support for communities unfamiliar with application processes
- Develop mentoring relationships between established and emerging festival organisers
- Create shared resource pools (equipment, marketing, venues) for community celebrations
- Measure and promote the economic and social impact of funded celebrations
- 3.8 Ensure Accessible and Multilingual Communication

Recommendation: Implement comprehensive communication accessibility standards for all cultural information, programming, and promotional materials, including multiple languages and accessible formats.

Detailed Rationale:

The Meeting of Cultural Ministers' review of the National Arts and Disability Strategy (2019) identified information accessibility as one of the most significant barriers for culturally diverse people with disability. Even well-funded programs fail when communities cannot access or interpret materials. (https://www.arts.gov.au/what-we-do/access-and-participation/national-arts-and-disability-strategy)

Effective communication requires multiple overlapping strategies, including:

- Auslan interpretation at events and in promotional videos
- Easy English versions of key information
- Braille and large print materials
- Audio description for visual elements
- Screen reader-compatible digital content
- Translated materials in key community languages
- Cultural mediators to facilitate engagement

Implementation actions:

- Develop comprehensive accessibility guidelines for all Council cultural communications

- Create a translation fund for cultural organisations to access professional services
- Implement language identification tools on all digital platforms
- Train staff in creating accessible communications
- Audit all cultural venue information for accessibility compliance
- Create an accessibility checklist for all funded events and programs
- Establish a community translation verification process to ensure quality
- 3.9 Increase Inclusive Employment in the Cultural Sector

Recommendation: Establish targeted pathways for employment, leadership, and professional development for people from CALD backgrounds and people with disability within Adelaide's cultural institutions and creative industries.

Detailed Rationale:

The Australia Council for the Arts "Making Art Work" research provides data on diversity in the arts workforce. (https://australiacouncil.gov.au/advocacy-and-research/making-art-work/)

Arts Access Australia works to improve employment outcomes for artists with disability through targeted programs and advocacy. (https://artsaccessaustralia.org/resources/)

Diversity Arts Australia's "Shifting the Balance" study examined representation in Australia's cultural institutions. (https://diversityarts.org.au/tools-research/shifting-the-balance-research/)

The policy makes a general commitment to "support cultural jobs and creative careers". However, it lacks specific measures to address the historical exclusion of marginalised communities from the cultural workforce.

- Establish paid internships specifically for CALD people with disability
- Create a cultural sector diversity employment target with accountability measures

- Develop subsidised training programs for underrepresented communities
- Implement mentoring programs with established cultural sector leaders
- Support cultural entrepreneurship through targeted business development
- Create pathways from community cultural practice to professional opportunities
- Ensure accessible workplaces with appropriate adaptive technologies
- 3.10 Track Cultural Participation and Inclusion Metrics

Recommendation: Develop comprehensive data collection and analysis frameworks to measure participation, representation, and outcomes across cultural programs, with detailed demographic analysis.

Detailed Rationale:

Diversity Arts Australia emphasises the importance of measurement in creating change. (https://diversityarts.org.au/tools-research/)

The Australian Human Rights Commission notes that cultural institutions often lack baseline data on who accesses (or cannot access) their programs, making it difficult to address gaps effectively. (https://humanrights.gov.au/our-work/rights-and-freedoms/publications)

Current measurement approaches typically count attendance without demographic analysis, masking disparities in participation across different communities.

- Establish baseline participation measures across cultural programs
- Collect disaggregated data on participation by cultural background, language, disability status, and other relevant factors
- Implement consistent evaluation methodologies across Council cultural programs
- Develop community-designed evaluation metrics that reflect community priorities
- Create multilingual feedback mechanisms

- Publish annual diversity and inclusion reports with transparent metrics
- Use data to drive resource allocation and program development
- 3.11 Establish Dedicated Accessibility and Multicultural Funding Pools

Recommendation: Create protected funding streams specifically for accessibility improvements and multicultural initiatives within the cultural budget.

Detailed Rationale:

The South Australian Multicultural Act 2021 encourages public authorities to allocate resources to support multicultural policy objectives. Without dedicated funding, these objectives remain aspirational rather than operational. (https://www.legislation.sa.gov.au/lz?path=/c/a/multicultural%20act%202021)

The National Arts and Disability Strategy emphasises the need for dedicated accessibility funding to overcome historical underinvestment of inaccessible cultural infrastructure and programming. (https://www.arts.gov.au/what-we-do/access-and-participation/national-arts-and-disability-strategy)

CALD communities often face barriers to accessing general funding pools due to:

- Limited grant-writing capacity or experience
- Lack of established relationships with funding bodies
- Unfamiliarity with application processes
- Language barriers in application materials
- Requirements for matched funding

- Establish a dedicated multicultural arts fund
- Create an accessibility infrastructure improvement fund
- Implement simplified application processes in multiple languages
- Provide grant-writing support for first-time applicants
- Develop percentage-based allocation from the overall cultural budget
- Create reporting frameworks that demonstrate outcomes and impact

- Secure multi-year funding commitments to enable sustainable planning
- 3.12 Develop Approaches for Navigating Geopolitical Impacts

Recommendation: Incorporate frameworks and strategies for addressing how global geopolitical shifts affect Adelaide's cultural landscape, intercommunity relations, and cultural safety.

Detailed Rationale:

The Lowy Institute regularly tracks how international relations affect Australian communities and social cohesion.

(https://www.lowyinstitute.org/publications/subject/australian-foreign-relations)

The Australian Government's Social Cohesion Framework acknowledges the impact of global events on local communities.

(https://www.homeaffairs.gov.au/about-us/our-portfolios/social-cohesion)

The draft policy operates in a geopolitical vacuum, failing to acknowledge how global events shape local cultural dynamics and community needs.

- Develop cultural mediation protocols for navigating sensitive international issues
- Create neutral dialogue spaces for communities affected by international tensions
- Establish rapid response mechanisms for cultural safety during periods of heightened international conflict
- Provide training for cultural workers on conflict-sensitive programming
- Engage diaspora communities in developing appropriate cultural responses to international events
- Create ethical frameworks for cultural exchange with regions experiencing political tensions
- 4. Conclusion and Future Directions

The City of Adelaide's draft Cultural Policy 2025-2036 establishes the necessary foundations for developing a vibrant, inclusive cultural ecosystem. However, to truly deliver on its vision of Adelaide as Australia's cultural and creative capital, the policy must transform symbolic recognition into structural inclusion while acknowledging the complex global context in which local cultural practices exist.

The recommendations outlined in this submission provide a roadmap for transforming how cultural policy operates. By adopting these evidence-based approaches, the City of Adelaide can:

- 1. Create a cultural landscape that authentically reflects its demographic diversity
- 2. Ensure equitable access and participation for all residents
- 3. Position Adelaide as a national leader in inclusive cultural practice
- 4. Generate economic and social returns through expanded cultural participation
- 5. Build stronger, more connected communities through shared cultural experiences
- 6. Develop resilience in navigating global tensions that affect local cultural relations

As a city with rich cultural diversity and a progressive approach to inclusion, Adelaide has the opportunity to become a national and international exemplar of culturally inclusive practice. Doing so will align with the UNESCO Creative Cities mission referenced in the policy and position Adelaide as a genuinely global cultural capital—one that embraces and celebrates its whole demographic reality.

MCCSA commits to working collaboratively with the City of Adelaide to implement these recommendations and create a cultural policy that ensures every story is valued, every voice is heard, and every culture is celebrated.

Overall comments:

- Excellent to see the City commit to a Cultural Policy, bringing together key threads of amplification and connection, across local, national and international platforms
- Pleased that the Policy encompasses the entire expanse of the City, and its subsidiaries for a united, integrated approach
- Important to see the connections across the City's strategic plan, and iconic differentiators such as the UNESCO designation
- In reading the policy, we were looking for the intentionality of the
 policy e.g. the articulation of the City's active role in cultivation,
 creation and investment in regards to landmark arts and cultural
 offerings/infrastructure that will contribute to defining Adelaide. We note
 that supporting and amplifying are critical tenets, and this comment is
 not to disregard how important these aspects are.
- There are some very exciting opportunities for AGSA to lean into this
 policy position with the City; particularly given AGSA's vision to be the
 most inspiring art destination in Australia:
 - building local, national and international partnerships to deliver destination-making cultural experiences available to hundreds of thousands of visitors each year that drive emotional connections with Adelaide as well as a strong economic impact,
 - Tarnanthi the nations' leading First Nations visual arts festival that grows artists and creative ideas from early seeds through to full production, and engages with thousands of First Nations artists and vast audiences across the CBD (and beyond),
 - Nurturing and growing future audiences for arts and cultural experiences across the city,
 - The development and amplification of live music and building the talent and audience pipeline,
 - As custodian of a significant heritage and contemporaneous collection of visual art that is made available to residents and visitors from far and wide, and so much more

Revised

The revised purpose expands the City's ambition by positioning Adelaide as a "global cultural capital" through to 2036, while the policy now explicitly commits to leveraging partnerships across international, national, state, and local levels—supporting AGSA's vision for building destination-making cultural experiences.

The amplified emphasis on Adelaide's UNESCO City of Music status reinforces its global cultural identity, while expanded language under the *Amplifying Our Creative Capital* principle strengthens Council's role in driving cultural tourism and supporting creative careers. The policy also highlights the delivery of affordable, accessible, and community-led cultural experiences, indicating openness to collaboration with cultural institutions such as AGSA in precinct-based programming.

There are opportunities to further articulate the City's leadership in initiating and co-investing in landmark cultural infrastructure and major artistic initiatives—ensuring Adelaide's cultural ambitions are matched by bold, strategic action. These opportunities for initiatives and actions are to be developed and detailed as part of implementation and organisational planning.

Principle – Amplifying Creative Capital

- The focus on amplification underscores the earlier reflection perhaps this is a language nuance with the wording of the 'Lead' point.
- This principle is both addressing local opportunities (connecting, amplifying) and international with a focus on Unesco creative cities, but there seems to be an opportunity to bring these together

Principle - Culturally inclusive

- Curious about the decision to itemise the focus areas when collectively they cover such a broad scope? Is this for a specific reason?
- This is a powerful and exciting pillar the outcomes will always be in the how, action and decisions around engagement and investment

Principle Reconciliation and Truth Telling – excellent to see

Principle Preserving Cultural Heritage, Embracing progress

 Appreciate the principles of looking back and looking forward, and wonder if there could be stronger integration between Reconciliation and Truth Telling and this pillar.

Principle Creating Space for Cultural Expression

- Celebrate this pillar for the way it captures the need for ideas and infrastructure to realise them
- Under the 'Enable' strand, curious about the word safe and what is intended by its use here. I also wondered about the emphasis on events in this section. Is that intentional or intended to be a broader expression?
- Under 'promote' strand, what is intended by the use of the word 'Celebrate'?

City of Adelaide Committees, Subsidaries and Advisory Panels:

During April and May 2025, further consultation was undertaken with City of Adelaide Committees, subsidiaries, and advisory panels through a combination of email, in-person meetings, and direct engagement. Their feedback and input is below:

Adelaide Economic Development Agency AEDA Advisory Committee

The AEDA Advisory Committee were supportive of the direction of the policy and the value that the cultural sector brings to the life of the City including its economy.

- During the discussion the following points were raised:
 - The impact of cultural shifts on the night time entertainment economy and the need for policies and programs to be delivered collaboratively with businesses and property owners, noting it could be difficult to reestablish entertainment venues once they have been closed and the property owner considers using those venues for other purposes..
 - The Policy could be strengthened by recognising the City's position the City as a gateway to South Australia's regional areas. This would involve thinking about how we celebrate or reflect our State's outback and agricultural cultural heritage.
 - Youth engagement could be strengthened, and the Policy should have greater focus on attracting young people and fostering their cultural connection to the City.

Revised

The Cultural Policy recognises the vital role of culture in shaping the life and economy of the City. Through the *Amplifying Our Creative Capital* principle, it commits to supporting cultural jobs and creative careers as drivers of economic growth, innovation, and employment. It also acknowledges Adelaide as a "vibrant gateway to the regions," reflecting its broader cultural identity within South Australia. Young people are identified as a priority group under the *Culturally Inclusive and Socially Connected* principle, with a commitment to inclusive participation across diverse communities. While this demonstrates a clear intent, the Policy will allow for opportunities to further support this by developing specific, co-designed initiatives that foster young people's creative development and cultural engagement across the organisation in a variety of strategies and action plans.

ROYAL AGRICULTURAL & HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA INCORPORATED of PO Box 108, Goodwood SA 5034 (Society)

BACKGROUND

- A. The Society is charged with the responsibility to conduct the Royal Adelaide Show annually at the Adelaide Showground.
- B. Council has the care control and management of Park Lands in the vicinity of the Adelaide Showground, which have historically been used for the purposes of providing parking for the Royal Adelaide Show.
- C. The parties have a long-term goal to phase out the use of the Park Lands for broadacre parking for the Royal Adelaide Show.
- D. This deed provides a framework within which the parties will work towards achieving that goal and also regulates how parking on the Park Lands will be managed during the interim period.

AGREED TERMS

1. DEFINITIONS AND INTERPRETATION

1.1 Definitions

Adelaide Showground means the land at Wayville, South Australia occupied or controlled by the Society for the purposes of conducting the Royal Adelaide Show.

Business Day means a day that is not a Saturday, Sunday or public holiday in Adelaide.

Commencement Date means the date of execution of this deed.

Initial Term means a term of five years commencing on the Commencement Date.

Park Lands means the Adelaide Park Lands as defined by the Adelaide Park Lands Plan deposited in the General Registry Office of South Australia.

Renewal Terms means two terms of five years each.

Term means the Initial Term and the Renewal Term(s).

1.2 Interpretation

In this deed, unless the context otherwise requires:

- 1.2.1 headings do not affect interpretation;
- 1.2.2 singular includes plural and plural includes singular;
- 1.2.3 words of one gender include any gender;
- 1.2.4 a reference to a party includes its executors, administrators, successors and permitted assigns;
- 1.2.5 a reference to a person includes a partnership, corporation, association, government body and any other entity;
- 1.2.6 a provision is not construed against a party only because that party drafted it;
- 1.2.7 if a provision of this deed binds two or more parties, that provision binds those parties jointly and severally;
- 1.2.8 an unenforceable provision or part of a provision may be severed, and the remainder of this deed continues in force, unless this would materially change the intended effect of this deed;
- 1.2.9 the meaning of general words is not limited by specific examples introduced by 'including', 'for example' or similar expressions; and
- 1.2.10 an obligation on a party to use "reasonable endeavours" to do a thing requires the party to do all the party reasonably can to do the thing, taking into account all of the personal circumstances and commercial interests of that party.

1.3 Background

The Background forms part of this deed and is correct.

1.4 Ambiguity

In the event of any ambiguity in the interpretation of this deed, this deed is to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the Report presented to the Council on 23/8/2011 titled Royal Adelaide Show – Parking [2010/02708].

2. KEY OBJECTIVES

The key objectives of this deed are to:

- 2.1 recognise the parties' shared aspiration of eventually removing broad-acre parking from the Park Lands for the Royal Adelaide Show through:
 - 2.1.1 the cooperative efforts of the parties, the State Government and Local Government to improve public transport capable of servicing the Adelaide Showground; and

- 2.1.2 the continued efforts of the Society to improve the parking capacity of the Adelaide Showground;
- 2.2 provide for the ongoing interim use of portions of the Park Lands for parking; and
- 2.3 provide for the relocation of parking areas and better management of parking to minimise damage to the Park Lands.

3. TERM

3.1 Term

This deed commences on the Commencement Date and expires at the end of the Term.

3.2 Periodic review

- 3.2.1 The parties will comprehensively evaluate the success and ongoing operation of this deed at the conclusion of the first year and at least twice during the Term with a view to reducing the number of parking spaces in line with the parties' long-term goal.
- 3.2.2 If during the Term the parties agree that the objectives of this deed have been met such that parking on the Park Lands is no longer required, this deed may be terminated in writing.

3.3 Extension of Initial Term

3.3.1 First Renewal Term

The Society may exercise its right to extend this deed for a period of five years (**First Renewal Term**) by notice in writing to Council prior to the expiry of the Initial Term, on the same terms as this deed except for the exclusion of this clause 3.3.1 commencing immediately after the Initial Term expires.

3.3.2 Second Renewal Term

The Society may exercise its right to extend this deed for a second period of five years (**Second Renewal Term**) by notice in writing to Council prior to the expiry of the First Renewal Term, on the same terms as this deed except for the exclusion of this clause 3.3.2 commencing immediately after the First Renewal Term expires.

4. GENERAL ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Council and the Society acknowledge and agree that both parties intend to follow the processes, protocols, procedures and practices outlined in this deed (or such further agreements made by the parties from time to time) and use their reasonable endeavours to seek to fulfil the key objectives of this deed as set out in clause 2.

5. LONG-TERM TRANSPORT SOLUTION

5.1 The parties will use their reasonable endeavours to achieve their shared longterm objective of removing parking from the Park Lands and will jointly consult

- and involve the State Government, adjoining councils and other stakeholders as and when required to facilitate that outcome.
- 5.2 Without limiting clause 5.1, the parties agree to prepare a Public Transport/Alternative Parking Plan (Plan) to work in conjunction with the State Government and The Corporation of the City of Unley to progressively reduce the long term parking demand on the Park Lands for the Royal Adelaide Show. The Plan will set aspirational goals for the increased use of public transport and alternative parking and identify strategies for jointly achieving these goals. The parties will jointly implement mutually agreed strategies and aim to reduce parking on the Park Lands as public transport availability increases and as additional (non-Park Lands) parking is made available.
- 5.3 The parties acknowledge that the Society has a long-term goal of 90% of patrons travelling to the Royal Adelaide Show by public transport and in working toward this outcome has, in conjunction with the State Government:
 - 5.3.1 installed an international standard bus zone on Goodwood Road;
 - 5.3.2 installed a temporary train station at Goodwood, which operates from the City to the Adelaide Showground;
 - 5.3.3 promoted public transport through its communications plan;
 - 5.3.4 acquired land to enable the Society to gradually increase parking capacity at the Adelaide Showground;
 - 5.3.5 assisted Council in eliminating parking on the Park Lands for other events at the Adelaide Showground by rearranging internal parking operations within the site;
 - 5.3.6 financially supported the Keswick Bike Path situated along the railway line;
 - 5.3.7 introduced a park and ride scheme at ETSA Stadium; and
 - 5.3.8 achieved a re-zoning of the Adelaide Showground to allow for multistorey car parks combined with office blocks.
- 5.4 Without limiting clauses 5.1 and 5.2, the Society will use its reasonable endeavours to continue to investigate, encourage and support the implementation of specific sustainable transport options including:
 - 5.4.1 electrification, modernisation and extension of rail services;
 - 5.4.2 construction of a permanent rail station servicing the Adelaide Showground and future Keswick Barracks development;
 - 5.4.3 extension of tram services and return of tram line into the Northern end of the Adelaide Showground;
 - 5.4.4 introduction of modern computerised public transport ticketing services that can be integrated into public event ticketing; and

5.4.5 a cultural shift within the community toward public transport as a result of providing convenient, reliable, affordable, safe and contemporary services.

6. INTERIM PARKING ARRANGEMENTS

6.1 Acknowledgements

The parties acknowledge and agree that:

- 6.1.1 Council (and the Adelaide Park Lands Authority) has a general policy position to work towards removing parking on the Park Lands, in order to best manage and conserve the Park Lands;
- 6.1.2 the required large scale improvements to public transport, including those set out in clause 5.4, are unlikely to be in place within the short term; and
- 6.1.3 given the considerable social and cultural importance of the Royal Adelaide Show it is considered reasonable to provide assurance to the Society and the public with respect to the continued availability of the Park Lands for parking, while taking appropriate steps to protect the amenity of the Park Lands.

6.2 Parking areas

- 6.2.1 Those areas of the Park Lands shaded in red, or shaded in green and outlined in red, on the plan attached as Annexure A will be made available for parking for a maximum of 2,650 vehicles, subject to clause 6.2.2.2, as required from time to time for the Royal Adelaide Show, subject to ground conditions being considered suitable at the time.
- 6.2.2 Those areas of the Park Lands marked "Area D" and "Area E" on the plan attached as Annexure A contain remnant native vegetation and as such will only be made available for parking for the Royal Adelaide Show:
 - 6.2.2.1 if ground conditions on the sporting fields (part of the areas described in clause 6.2.1 above) are unsuitable for parking and only until such surfaces are improved; and
 - 6.2.2.2 on up to three occasions during the Royal Adelaide Show as overflow areas on high-attendance days;

and Council will install signage as required to educate the public as to why parking will generally not be permitted on certain areas of the Park Lands.

6.2.3 Suitability of ground conditions will be determined by Council (acting reasonably) having regard to weather, works and other relevant factors in consultation with the Society prior to and during the Royal Adelaide Show.

6.2.4 It is acknowledged that certain areas of the Park Lands may in future and from time to time be redeveloped or otherwise subject to works such that they will, either temporarily or permanently, be unsuitable for parking. In any such event, Council will make provision for the parking of a minimum of 2,650 vehicles upon alternate proximate areas of the Park Lands, subject to ground conditions being considered suitable at the time.

6.3 Responsibility for management of parking

- 6.3.1 Council will continue to manage parking operations on the Park Lands.
- 6.3.2 Council will undertake an annual review of its traffic management plan for Royal Adelaide Show parking, in consultation with the Society, SAPOL and the City of Unley.
- 6.3.3 Where Council considers it reasonable and practicable, Council undertakes to provide a limited amount of discounted parking in its city parking stations adjacent to bus and tram stops during the Royal Adelaide Show to discourage parking on the Park Lands.

6.4 Fees

Current fees charged by Council for parking on the Park Lands will during the Term only be increased annually in accordance with the Adelaide CPI, except as otherwise agreed between the parties.

6.5 First right of refusal to manage parking within the Adelaide Showground during the period of the Royal Adelaide Show

If during the Term the Society proposes to enter into a contract or other arrangement for the management of off-street parking within the Adelaide Showground during the period of the Royal Adelaide Show:

- 6.5.1 the Society must serve on Council written notice of the Society's intention enter into a contract or other arrangement for the management of off-street parking for the period of the Royal Adelaide Show (Notice) and the terms upon which the Society is prepared to enter into such contract or other arrangement (Contract);
- 6.5.2 Council may accept the offer within 30 days after service of the Notice and Contract on Council by delivering to the Society the Contract executed by Council;
- 6.5.3 upon acceptance of the offer, the parties are bound by the Contract;
- 6.5.4 within seven days after receipt of the Contract, the Society must execute the Contract and deliver a copy to Council;
- 6.5.5 if Council does not accept the offer, the Society may enter into a contract with a third party within three months of the Notice at a price and on terms that are not less favourable to the Society;
- 6.5.6 the term of any Notice given under this clause shall be kept strictly confidential between the parties to this deed.

6.6 Displacement of existing Park Lands licence holders

6.6.1 Adelaide Lutheran Sports and Recreation Association Incorporated

- 6.6.1.1 The Adelaide Lutheran Sports and Recreation Association Incorporated (ALSRA) has a licence over part of the Park Lands, namely certain sports ovals.
- 6.6.1.2 The ALSRA's use of the sports ovals during the Royal Adelaide Show will be restricted or prevented as required (by suspension of the ALSRA's licence to use such area or otherwise).
- 6.6.1.3 Council will use its reasonable endeavours to relocate the ALSRA to alternative sports ovals during the Royal Adelaide Show.
- 6.6.1.4 Council supports the allocation of a reasonable and appropriate portion of revenue obtained from Royal Adelaide Show parking to assist with improvements to the sports ovals, specifically:
 - (a) a connection to the Glenelg Adelaide Pipeline recycled water supply;
 - (b) an initial series of treatments to improve the playing/parking surface;
 - (c) a contribution towards the annual maintenance of the playing surface to improve the capability of the surface to sustain vehicular traffic; and
 - (d) ongoing restoration following parking.

6.6.2 SA United Church Netball Association Incorporated

- 6.6.2.1 The SA United Church Netball Association Incorporated (SAUCNA) has a licence over portion of the Park Lands, namely certain netball courts.
- 6.6.2.2 The SAUCNA's use of the parking area adjacent to the netball courts during the Royal Adelaide Show will be restricted or prevented as required (by suspension of the SAUCNA's licence to use such area or otherwise).
- 6.6.2.3 The SAUCNA has been advised by Council that parking on the parking area during the Royal Adelaide Show will attract a fee.

7. COMMUNICATION AND CONSULTATION

While the parties acknowledge the responsibility each party has to their own constituencies, they further agree to a process of communiqués and community consultation and to refrain from any deliberate and adverse public comments regarding

the other parties to this deed (in the context of the subject matter of this deed) should disagreements arise in the pursuit of the objectives set out in this deed.

8. CONFIDENTIALITY AND FOI

- 8.1 The Freedom of Information Act 1991 (SA) (FOI Act) gives members of the public rights to access documents of Council. The FOI Act promotes openness in governance and accountability of government agencies and to achieve these objects confers on members of the public a legally enforceable right to be given access to documents, including contracts, held by Council subject but not limited to such restrictions as are consistent with the public interest, commercial in confidence and/or the preservation of personal privacy in respect of those from whom information is collected and held by Council and other public authorities.
- 8.2 The Society acknowledges Council's obligations to comply with the FOI Act and consents to any disclosures by Council, subject to the Society's rights of consultation, review and appeal, and such other challenge to legal disclosure as the Society may make.

9. TERMINATION FOR BREACH

- 9.1 A party may elect to terminate this deed if another party breaches a condition of this deed and fails to rectify such breach within a reasonable time of being requested in writing to do so.
- 9.2 Without prejudice to the rights of a party in respect of any claim or breach of the provisions of this deed prior to the date of termination, the liability of each party under this deed shall cease upon termination.
- 9.3 Clause 8 and any obligation that arises prior to termination shall survive termination of this deed.

10. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

10.1 General

- 10.1.1 A party must not commence arbitration or court proceedings (except for urgent relief) in respect of a dispute under this deed, unless it first attempts to resolve the dispute by negotiation and mediation under this clause.
- 10.1.2 A party claiming that a dispute has arisen under this deed must give written notice to the other party specifying the nature and details of the dispute.
- 10.1.3 On receipt of that notice by the other party, the parties must negotiate in good faith to resolve the dispute.
- 10.1.4 If the parties are unable to resolve the dispute within 10 Business Days, they must promptly refer the dispute to their respective Chief Executive Officers.
- 10.1.5 Those persons must meet to resolve the dispute and must be authorised to resolve the dispute.

10.2 Mediation

- 10.2.1 If those persons are unable to resolve the dispute within 10 Business Days of referral, a party may refer the dispute for mediation under the mediation rules of the Law Society of South Australia Inc to:
 - 10.2.1.1 a mediator agreed by the parties; or
 - 10.2.1.2 if the parties are unable to agree a mediator within five Business Days, a mediator nominated by the President of the Law Society or the President's nominee.
- 10.2.2 The role of a mediator is to assist in negotiating a resolution of the dispute. A mediator may not make a decision that is binding on a party unless that party has agreed in writing.
- 10.2.3 Any information or documents disclosed by a party under this clause:
 - 10.2.3.1 must be kept confidential; and
 - 10.2.3.2 may not be used except to attempt to resolve the dispute.
- 10.2.4 Each party must bear its own mediation costs. The parties must bear equally the costs of any mediator.

10.3 Arbitration

- 10.3.1 If the dispute is not resolved within 10 Business Days of appointment of the mediator, a party may refer the dispute to:
 - 10.3.1.1 an arbitrator agreed by the parties; or
 - 10.3.1.2 if the parties are unable to agree an arbitrator within five Business Days, an arbitrator nominated by the Chairperson of the South Australian Chapter of The Institute of Arbitrators and Mediators Australia or the Chairperson's nominee.
- 10.3.2 A referral to arbitration is a submission to arbitration within the meaning of the *Commercial Arbitration and Industrial Referral Agreements Act 1986* (SA).
- 10.3.3 The party serving the notice of arbitration must lodge with the arbitrator a security deposit for the cost of the arbitration proceedings.
- 10.3.4 The arbitrator may determine the amount of costs, how costs are to be apportioned and by whom they must be paid.

10.4 Performance

If possible, each party must perform its obligations under this deed during negotiations, mediation and arbitration proceedings.

11. NOTICES

Any notice issued under this deed must be in writing and either sent by facsimile, mail or delivered by hand.

- 11.4 A notice may be signed by a party's authorised legal or other representative.
- 11.5 A notice sent by mail or delivered by hand is effective upon receipt.
- 11.6 A notice sent by facsimile is effective upon receipt of confirmation of successful transmission to the recipient unless it is transmitted after the close of normal business hours, or on a Saturday, Sunday or public holiday, in which case it is effective on the opening of business on the next Business Day at the intended place of receipt.

12. GENERAL

12.1 Relationship between the parties

- 12.1.1 The relationship between the parties is limited to the purposes of this deed and is not to be construed as a partnership, joint venture, principal and agent, trust, fiduciary or any other special relationship.
- 12.1.2 No party is obliged to incur any further obligation unless it expressly agrees to do so in writing.
- 12.1.3 The parties will not assume or create, or attempt to assume or create, directly or indirectly, any obligation on behalf of, or in the name of, the other party.

12.2 Assignment

A party must not assign any of its rights under this deed without the prior written consent of the other party.

12.3 Amendment

This deed can only be amended, modified, varied, released or discharged by written agreement of the parties and will form an annexure to this deed.

12.4 Severability

If any provision in this deed is voidable or unenforceable, that provision will be severed and the rest of this deed will remain in full force and effect.

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12.5 No waiver

- 12.5.1 No right under this deed will be deemed to be waived except by notice in writing signed by the party giving the waiver.
- 12.5.2 A waiver by a party under clause 12.5.1 will not prejudice that party's rights in respect of any subsequent breach of this deed by the other party.
- 12.5.3 Subject to clause 12.5.1, any failure by a party to enforce any clause of this deed, or any forbearance, delay or indulgence granted by the party to the other party, will not be construed as a waiver of the first mentioned party's rights under this deed.

12.6 Governing law

The laws of South Australia apply to this deed and the parties submit to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of South Australia.

12.7 Announcements

No party may make any press or other release or announcement relating to the commercial terms of this deed without the written approval of the other parties as to form, content and manner of the announcement or release.

12.8 Entire agreement

This deed constitutes the entire, final and concluded agreement between the parties in relation to the subject matter contained herein. It supersedes any previous arrangements, correspondence, tenders, representations, proposals, understandings and communications whether oral or in writing.

12.9 Costs

Each party will bear its own costs of and incidental to the preparation, negotiation, execution and stamping of this deed.



BACKGROUND

- A. The Society is charged with the responsibility to conduct the Royal Adelaide Show annually at the Adelaide Showground.
- B. Council has the care control and management of Park Lands in the vicinity of the Adelaide Showground, which have historically been used for the purposes of providing parking for the Royal Adelaide Show. Council has supported this use since 1926.
- C. The parties entered into the Original Deed which (amongst other things):
 - (a) outlined the arrangements to make available certain portion of the Park Lands for carparking to support the Royal Adelaide Show;
 - (b) confirmed the shared long-term goal to phase out the use of the Park Lands for broad-acre parking for the Royal Adelaide Show; and
 - (c) provided a framework within which the parties will work towards achieving that goal and also regulates how parking on the Park Lands will be managed during the interim period.
- D. The Original Deed is due to expire on 27 November 2026.
- E. The parties have agreed to enter this deed to operate with effect from the Commencement Date to update the framework with respect to parking cars on the Park Lands on the terms of this deed having regard to the Agreed Objectives.

AGREED TERMS

1. **DEFINITIONS AND INTERPRETATION**

1.1 **Definitions**

Adelaide Showground means the land at Wayville, South Australia occupied or controlled by the Society for the purposes of conducting the Royal Adelaide Show.

Agreed Objectives includes the objectives as set out in clause 2.

Biodiversity Areas means those areas as marked and shown on the plan comprising Annexure A.

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Business Day means a day that is not a Saturday, Sunday or public holiday in Adelaide.

Commencement Date means the 28 November 2026

Initial Term means a term of five (5) years commencing on the Commencement Date.

First Renewal Term means a period of five (5) years commencing 28 November 2031 and expiring 27 November 2036

Original Deed means the document titled "Deed – Royal Adelaide Show Parking" and dated or about 27 November 2011

Park Lands means the Adelaide Park Lands as defined by the Adelaide Park Lands Plan deposited in the General Registry Office of South Australia.

Second Renewal Term means a period of five (5) years commencing 28 November 2036 and expiring 27 November 2041

Term means the Initial Term and (if granted) the First Renewal Term and the Second Renewal Term.

1.2 Interpretation

In this deed, unless the context otherwise requires:

- 1.2.1 headings do not affect interpretation;
- 1.2.2 singular includes plural and plural includes singular;
- 1.2.3 words of one gender include any gender;
- 1.2.4 a reference to a party includes its executors, administrators, successors and permitted assigns;
- 1.2.5 a reference to a person includes a partnership, corporation, association, government body and any other entity;
- 1.2.6 a provision is not construed against a party only because that party drafted it;
- 1.2.7 if a provision of this deed binds two or more parties, that provision binds those parties jointly and severally;
- 1.2.8 an unenforceable provision or part of a provision may be severed, and the remainder of this deed continues in force, unless this would materially change the intended effect of this deed;
- 1.2.9 the meaning of general words is not limited by specific examples introduced by 'including', 'for example' or similar expressions; and
- 1.2.10 an obligation on a party to use "reasonable endeavours" to do a thing requires the party to do all the party reasonably can to do the thing, taking into account all of the personal circumstances and commercial interests of that party.



1.3 Background

The Background forms part of this deed and is correct.

1.4 Ambiguity

In the event of any ambiguity in the interpretation of this deed, this deed is to be interpreted in a manner consistent with the Report presented to the Council on 23/8/2011 titled Royal Adelaide Show- Parking (2010/02708).

2. KEY OBJECTIVES

2.1 Original Deed

The Council and the Society acknowledge the key objectives of the Original Deed were to:

- 2.1.1 recognise the parties' shared aspiration of eventually removing broadacre parking from the Park Lands for the Royal Adelaide Show through:
 - 2.1.1.1 the cooperative efforts of the parties, the State Government and Local Government to improve public transport capable of servicing the Adelaide Showground; and
 - 2.1.1.2 the continued efforts of the Society to improve the parking capacity of the Adelaide Showground;
- 2.1.2 provide for the ongoing interim use of portions of the Park Lands for parking; and
- 2.1.3 provide for the relocation of parking areas and better management of parking to minimise damage to the Park Lands.

2.2 Further objectives

Without limiting clause 2.1, the Council and the Society acknowledge further objectives include:

- 2.2.1 a further minimum reduction to car parking on the Park Lands of ten (10%, 227 car parks) per centum over the Term based on the 2022 baseline of 2270 car parks;
- 2.2.2 recognition and protection for Biodiversity Areas; and
- 2.2.3 a continued focus on promotional activities to further promote and encourage the use of public transport.

3. **TERM**

3.1 **Term**

This deed commences on the Commencement Date and, subject clause 3.3, expires at the end of the Term.



3.2 Periodic review

- 3.2.1 The parties will comprehensively evaluate the success and ongoing operation of this deed at the conclusion of the first year of the Initial Term and then again within the six (6) months before the commencement of either the First Renewal Term or the Second Renewal Term (as the case may be) with a view to reducing the number of parking spaces in line with the parties' long-term goal.
- 3.2.2 Without limiting clause 3.2.1, any review is to include a review of space requirements in support of the objective of a decreased dependency on the Park Lands for car parking and a review of the masterplan referred to in clause 5.3.
- 3.2.3 If during the Term the parties agree that the objectives of this deed have been met such that parking on the Park Lands is no longer required, this deed may be terminated in writing.

3.3 Extension of Initial Term

3.3.1 First Renewal Term

The Society may request an extension of this deed for a period of five (5) years (**First Renewal Term**) by notice in writing to Council prior to the expiry of the Initial Term.

3.3.2 Second Renewal Term

The Society may request an extension of this deed for a second period of five (5) years (**Second Renewal Term**) by notice in writing to Council prior to the expiry of the First Renewal Term.

3.3.3 Council to assess request

On receipt of a request under clauses 3.3.1 or 3.3.2 (as the case may be) the Council and the Society will meet to discuss the request and it will be considered by Council having regard to the performance of the terms of this deed.

3.3.4 No obligation to extend

The Society acknowledges that the Council is under no obligation to extend this deed and, to the extent Council agrees to do so, any extension may include additional terms reasonably required by Council consistent with Agreed Objectives.

3.3.5 **Continued arrangements**

If the Society has not requested an extension of this deed under this clause 3 prior to the end of either the Initial Term or the First Renewed Term (if exercised) then, unless otherwise agreed, this deed will continue to operate on a yearly basis which may be ended by either party serving notice on the other on or before 31 January in any year.



4. GENERAL ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

4.1 Fulfil objectives

Council and the Society acknowledge and agree that both parties intend to follow the processes, protocols, procedures and practices outlined in this deed (or such further agreements made by the parties from time to time) and use their reasonable endeavours to seek to fulfil the Agreed Objectives.

4.2 Inconsistency

If there is any inconsistency between the objectives from the Original Deed set out in clause 2.1 and the further objectives under this deed referenced in clause 2.2, to the extent of that inconsistency the further objectives in clause 2.2 prevail.

5. LONG-TERM TRANSPORT SOLUTION

- 5.1 The parties will use their reasonable endeavours to achieve their shared long-term objective of reducing parking from the Park Lands and will jointly consult and involve the State Government, adjoining councils and other stakeholders as and when required to facilitate that outcome.
- 5.2 The parties acknowledge that the Society has a long-term goal of 90% of patrons travelling to the Royal Adelaide Show by public transport and in working toward this outcome has:
 - 5.2.1 assisted and supported the State Government during the construction and activation of the permanent Adelaide Showground Railway Station;
 - 5.2.2 acquired further land to enable the Society to increase parking capacity at the Showground;
 - 5.2.3 activated strategically placed, dedicated taxi and rideshare ranks;
 - 5.2.4 installed bicycle/scooter parking facilities at Northern and Southern entrances to the Showground;
 - 5.2.5 supported the installation of a safe pedestrian/bicycle crossing to the Showground from the Park Lands;
 - 5.2.6 worked collaboratively with the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) to balance the cost of additional public transport services operated during the Show;
 - 5.2.7 actively promoted the use of public transport to the Show via website, media and social media in the lead up to and during the event;
 - 5.2.8 worked with DIT and CoA to provide a convenient, lower-cost alternative to Park Lands parking on weekends of Show; and
 - 5.2.9 embarked on a master planning exercise that specifically considers event car parking requirements and the Society's long-term ambition to



have 90% of patrons travelling to and from the Show by sustainable means.

5.3 Without limiting clause 5.1, the Society agrees to prepare a master plan that specifically considers event car parking requirements and aims to enable the Society to achieve its long-term ambition to have 90% of patrons travelling to and from the Show by sustainable means.

6. PARKING ARRANGEMENTS

6.1 Acknowledgements

The parties acknowledge and agree that:

- 6.1.1 Council (and the Adelaide Park Lands Authority) has a general policy position to work towards reducing parking on the Park Lands in order to best manage and conserve the Park Lands including reducing available areas of Park Lands to accommodate repurposing of areas for other uses; and
- 6.1.2 given the considerable social and cultural importance of the Royal Adelaide Show it is considered reasonable to provide assurance to the Society and the public with respect to the continued availability of the Park Lands for parking, while taking appropriate steps to protect the amenity of the Park Lands.

6.2 Parking areas

- 6.2.1 Those areas of the Park Lands shaded in green on the plan attached as Annexure A will be made available for parking for a maximum of 2,270 vehicles, subject to clause 6.2.2.2, as required from time to time for the Royal Adelaide Show, subject to ground conditions being considered suitable at the time.
- 6.2.2 Those areas of the Park Lands marked "Area B" and "Area D" on the plan attached as Annexure A contain remnant native vegetation and as such will only be made available for parking for the Royal Adelaide Show:
 - 6.2.2.1 if ground conditions on the sporting fields (part of the areas described in clause 6.2.1 above) are unsuitable for parking and only until such surfaces are improved; or
 - 6.2.2.2 on up to three occasions during the Royal Adelaide Show as overflow areas on high attendance days;

and Council will install signage as required to educate the public as to why parking will generally not be permitted on certain areas of the Park Lands.

- 6.2.3 There will be no carparking allowed on those areas shaded red on the plan attached as Annexure A (described as Biodiversity Areas).
- 6.2.4 Suitability of ground conditions will be determined by Council (acting reasonably) having regard to weather, works and other relevant factors



in consultation with the Society prior to and during the Royal Adelaide Show.

6.2.5 It is acknowledged that certain areas of the Park Lands may in future and from time to time be redeveloped or otherwise subject to works such that they will, either temporarily or permanently, be unsuitable for parking. To the extent reasonably practicable, Council will provide twenty four (24) months' notice of any redevelopment or works that will result in areas of the Park Lands being unsuitable for parking (and in which case Council will not be required to make provision for alternate car parking spaces). If Council is unable to provide at least twenty four (24) months' notice then Council will use reasonable endeavours to make provision of the same number of parking spaces upon proximate areas of the Park Lands (subject to ground conditions being considered suitable at the time) until twenty four months have passed since the provision of the notice referred to in this clause 6.2.5.

6.3 Responsibility for management of parking

- 6.3.1 Council will continue to manage parking operations on the Park Lands.
- 6.3.2 Council will undertake an annual review of its traffic management plan for Royal Adelaide Show parking, in consultation with the Society, SAPOL and the City of Unley.
- 6.3.3 Where Council considers it reasonable and practicable, Council undertakes to continue provide a limited amount of discounted parking in its city parking stations adjacent to bus and tram stops during the Royal Adelaide Show to discourage parking on the Park Lands and encourage alternate parking and transport options.

6.4 **Fees**

The fees to be charged by Council for parking on the Park Lands will be set by Council in consultation with the Society during the Term and reflect the convenience of parking in the Park Lands.

6.5 First right of refusal to manage "on site" Showground parking

If during the Term the Society proposes to enter into a contract or other arrangement for the management of off-street parking within the Adelaide Showground during the period of the Royal Adelaide Show:

- 6.5.1 the Society must serve on Council written notice of the Society's intention enter into a contract or other arrangement for the management of off-street parking for the period of the Royal Adelaide Show (**Notice**) and the terms upon which the Society is prepared to enter into such contract or other arrangement (**Contract**);
- 6.5.2 Council may accept the offer within thirty (30) days after service of the Notice and Contract on Council by delivering to the Society the Contract executed by Council;
- 6.5.3 upon acceptance of the offer, the parties are bound by the Contract;



- 6.5.4 within seven days after receipt of the Contract, the Society must execute the Contract and deliver a copy to Council;
- 6.5.5 if Council does not accept the offer, the Society may enter into a contract with a third party within three months of the Notice at a price and on terms that are not less favourable to the Society;
- 6.5.6 the term of any Notice given under this clause shall be kept strictly confidential between the parties to this deed.

6.6 Displacement of existing Park Lands lease and licence holders

- 6.6.1 The Society acknowledges and agrees any lease and licence holders (whether existing or future) with rights over areas of the Park Lands will have their use and activities restricted as a result of the arrangements contemplated by this deed.
- 6.6.2 Without limiting any other term of the deed, the Society and Council will work together (both parties acting reasonably and practically) to minimise the impact on those lease and licence holders.
- 6.6.3 The Society further acknowledges that Council supports the allocation of a reasonable and appropriate portion of revenue obtained from Royal Adelaide Show parking to assist with improvements to the sports ovals, specifically:
 - 6.6.3.1 a contribution towards the annual maintenance of the playing surface to improve the capability of the surface to sustain vehicular traffic; and
 - 6.6.3.2 ongoing restoration following parking; and

Council intends to continue to advise the holders of leases and licences that parking during the Royal Adelaide Show will attract a fee for those parties.

7. COMMUNICATION AND CONSULTATION

While the parties acknowledge the responsibility each party has to their own constituencies, they further agree to a process of communiqués and community consultation and to refrain from any deliberate and adverse public comments regarding the other parties to this deed (in the context of the subject matter of this deed) should disagreements arise in the pursuit of the objectives set out in this deed.

8. CONFIDENTIALITY AND FOI

8.1 The Freedom of Information Act 1991 (SA) (FOI Act) gives members of the public rights to access documents of Council. The FOI Act promotes openness in governance and accountability of government agencies and to achieve these objects confers on members of the public a legally enforceable right to be given access to documents, including contracts, held by Council subject but not limited to such restrictions as are consistent with the public interest, commercial in confidence and/or the preservation of personal privacy in respect of those from whom information is collected and held by Council and other public authorities.



8.2 The Society acknowledges Council's obligations to comply with the FOI Act and consents to any disclosures by Council, subject to the Society's rights of consultation, review and appeal, and such other challenge to legal disclosure as the Society may make.

9. TERMINATION FOR BREACH

- 9.1 A party may elect to terminate this deed if another party breaches a condition of this deed and fails to rectify such breach within a reasonable time of being requested in writing to do so.
- 9.2 Without prejudice to the rights of a party in respect of any claim or breach of the provisions of this deed prior to the date of termination, the liability of each party under this deed shall cease upon termination.
- 9.3 Clause 8 and any obligation that arises prior to termination shall survive termination of this deed.

10. **DISPUTE RESOLUTION**

10.1 General

- 10.1.1 A party must not commence arbitration or court proceedings (except for urgent relief) in respect of a dispute under this deed, unless it first attempts to resolve the dispute by negotiation and mediation under this clause.
- 10.1.2 A party claiming that a dispute has arisen under this deed must give written notice to the other party specifying the nature and details of the dispute.
- 10.1.3 On receipt of that notice by the other party, the parties must negotiate in good faith to resolve the dispute.
- 10.1.4 If the parties are unable to resolve the dispute within 10 Business Days, they must promptly refer the dispute to their respective Chief Executive Officers.
- 10.1.5 Those persons must meet to resolve the dispute and must be authorised to resolve the dispute.

10.2 **Mediation**

- 10.2.1 If those persons are unable to resolve the dispute within 10 Business Days of referral, a party may refer the dispute for mediation under the mediation rules of the Law Society of South Australia Inc to:
 - 10.2.1.1 a mediator agreed by the parties; or
 - 10.2.1.2 if the parties are unable to agree a mediator within five Business Days, a mediator nominated by the President of the Law Society or the President's nominee.



- 10.2.2 The role of a mediator is to assist in negotiating a resolution of the dispute. A mediator may not make a decision that is binding on a party unless that party has agreed in writing.
- 10.2.3 Any information or documents disclosed by a party under this clause:
 - 10.2.3.1 must be kept confidential; and
 - 10.2.3.2 may not be used except to attempt to resolve the dispute.
- 10.2.4 Each party must bear its own mediation costs. The parties must bear equally the costs of any mediator.

10.3 **Arbitration**

- 10.3.1 If the dispute is not resolved within 10 Business Days of appointment of the mediator, a party may refer the dispute to:
 - 10.3.1.1 an arbitrator agreed by the parties; or
 - 10.3.1.2 if the parties are unable to agree an arbitrator within five Business Days, an arbitrator nominated by the Chairperson of the South Australian Chapter of The Institute of Arbitrators and Mediators Australia or the Chairperson's nominee.
- 10.3.2 A referral to arbitration is a submission to arbitration within the meaning of the *Commercial Arbitration and Industrial Referral Agreements Act* 1986 (SA).
- 10.3.3 The party serving the notice of arbitration must lodge with the arbitrator a security deposit for the cost of the arbitration proceedings.
- 10.3.4 The arbitrator may determine the amount of costs, how costs are to be apportioned and by whom they must be paid.

10.4 **Performance**

If possible, each party must perform its obligations under this deed during negotiations, mediation and arbitration proceedings.

11. NOTICES

- 11.1 Any notice issued under this deed must be in writing and either sent by mail, email or delivered by hand.
- 11.2 A notice to Council must be addressed to:

- 11.4 A notice may be signed by a party's authorised legal or other representative.
- 11.5 A notice sent by mail, email or delivered by hand is effective upon receipt.

12. **GENERAL**

12.1 Relationship between the parties

- 12.1.1 The relationship between the parties is limited to the purposes of this deed and is not to be construed as a partnership, joint venture, principal and agent, trust, fiduciary or any other special relationship.
- 12.1.2 No party is obliged to incur any further obligation unless it expressly agrees to do so in writing.
- 12.1.3 The parties will not assume or create, or attempt to assume or create, directly or indirectly, any obligation on behalf of, or in the name of, the other party.

12.2 **Assignment**

A party must not assign any of its rights under this deed without the prior written consent of the other party.

12.3 Amendment

This deed can only be amended, modified, varied, released or discharged by written agreement of the parties and will form an annexure to this deed.

12.4 **Severability**

If any provision in this deed is voidable or unenforceable, that provision will be severed and the rest of this deed will remain in full force and effect.

12.5 No waiver

- 12.5.1 No right under this deed will be deemed to be waived except by notice in writing signed by the party giving the waiver.
- 12.5.2 A waiver by a party under clause 12.5.1 will not prejudice that party's rights in respect of any subsequent breach of this deed by the other party.
- 12.5.3 Subject to clause 12.5.1, any failure by a party to enforce any clause of this deed, or any forbearance, delay or indulgence granted by the party to the other party, will not be construed as a waiver of the first mentioned party's rights under this deed.

12.6 Governing law

The laws of South Australia apply to this deed and the parties submit to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of South Australia.



12.7 Announcements

No party may make any press or other release or announcement relating to the commercial terms of this deed without the written approval of the other parties as to form, content and manner of the announcement or release.

12.8 Entire agreement

This deed constitutes the entire, final and concluded agreement between the parties in relation to the subject matter contained herein. It supersedes any previous arrangements, correspondence, tenders, representations, proposals, understandings and communications whether oral or in writing.

12.9 **Costs**

Each party will bear its own costs of and incidental to the preparation, negotiation, execution and stamping of this deed.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with a summary of consultation responses to inform final decision-making ahead of its consideration of the 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget at the Council meeting on Tuesday 24 June 2025.

At its meeting on 29 April 2025, Council endorsed the Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget (BP&B) for the purpose of public consultation. Consultation on the Draft 2025/26 BP&B commenced at 9.00am on Tuesday 6 May 2025 and concluded at midnight on Tuesday 27 May 2025.

Consultation on the Draft 2025/26 BP&B provided ratepayers, key stakeholders and the wider community an opportunity to provide feedback. Key components of this consultation included informing and seeking feedback from the community on Council's services, programs, capital and strategic projects, updated fees and charges, changes to the Rating Policy and, Council's priorities to deliver on the City of Adelaide Strategic Plan 2024-2028.

Feedback on the Draft 2025/26 BP&B was provided in person to Council staff at drop-in sessions, via Council's online consultation platform Our Adelaide, and by email or in writing. As part of the consultation, 110 Our Adelaide surveys, 99 written submissions (letters and emails), and one verbal submission were received. Five community members elected to speak at the public hearing, held during the Council meeting on 27 May 2025.

An analysis of the feedback received is summarised in **Attachment A**. A copy of the feedback is provided in **Attachment B** (Our Adelaide surveys), **Attachment C** (written and verbal submissions), and **Attachment D** (in person feedback).

DISCUSSION

- 1. At its meeting on 29 April 2025, Council approved the Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget (BP&B) for the purpose of public consultation.
- 2. The public consultation activities undertaken exceeded statutory requirements and offered a range of methods for our community to consider Council's Draft 2025/26 BP&B and provide feedback.
- 3. Consultation was focused on seeking the views of the community on Council's services, programs, capital and strategic projects, updated fees and charges, changes to the Rating Policy, and Council's priorities. The Draft 2025/26 BP&B focuses on delivering on City of Adelaide Strategic Plan 2024-2028 by prioritising the following Key Actions:
 - 3.1. Supporting increased residential growth and housing affordability.
 - 3.2. Celebrating and elevating our community culture and multicultural communities by creating welcoming programs and services.
 - 3.3. Making electric vehicle charging available for users to improve Council and community performance on transport emissions.
 - 3.4. Creating innovative ways to create or convert underutilised areas to green space.
 - 3.5. Reinforcing the position of Adelaide as the State's central business district and amplifying Adelaide's reputation as a place to learn, work and start a business.
 - 3.6. Providing services and information that contribute towards a high productivity economy.
 - 3.7. Increasing active and diverse transport measures to ensure all City users can safely and easily move within the city.
 - 3.8. Encouraging repurposing and adaptive reuse of buildings and facilities.
 - 3.9. Creating, maintaining and integrating plans and policies that reflect and guide decision making to support our city and community to thrive.
 - 3.10. Attracting and retaining people with skills and behaviours which align with our organisational objectives and values.

Audit and Risk Committee Feedback

- 4. The Draft 2025/26 BP&B was also presented to the Audit and Risk Committee, at its meeting on 16 May 2025.
- 5. The Audit and Risk Committee provided feedback that [Link 1]:
 - 5.1. The Committee was supportive of Council's proposal to introduce a minimum rate.
 - 5.2. The Committee considered that the Draft 25/26 Business Plan and Budget appropriately responds to the financial sustainability observations of the ESCOSA report.

Community Consultation

- 6. Public consultation on the Draft 2025/26 BP&B was undertaken from 6 May 2025 to 27 May 2025. During the consultation there were:
 - 6.1. 6,341 total visits to the Draft 2025/26 BP&B project page on Council's consultation platform, Our Adelaide.
 - 6.2. 110 survey forms were received, either online on Our Adelaide or as a hard copy.
 - 6.3. 99 written submissions were received via email or letter. Written submissions are defined as any feedback received in writing that does not follow the survey format.
 - 6.4. One verbal submission was received.
 - 6.5. Five representations were made by community members to Council at its public hearing held during the Council meeting on 27 May 2025.
 - 6.6. Approximately 95 people were engaged during the four in-person sessions held at the Adelaide Central Market, Meander Market North Adelaide, Rundle Mall and the City Library Rundle Mall.
- 7. The consultation sought feedback from City of Adelaide ratepayers and residents, community and key stakeholders.

- 8. The consultation was advertised through general channels, including:
 - 8.1. Legislatively required public notice in the South Australian Government Gazette, The Advertiser public notices and the City of Adelaide website.
 - 8.2. An article in the Adelaide Economic Development Agency, Adelaide Central Market, City of Adelaide Libraries and Community Centres' newsletters.
 - 8.3. Notifications and displays at Council's Customer Centre, libraries, and community centres.
 - 8.4. Council's social media, with 30 posts published across the City of Adelaide Facebook, Instagram and LinkedIn accounts generating 52,153 views, with 3,742 people clicking to follow through to the link. An additional 5,856 people clicked the link through sponsored/paid posts on Facebook and Instagram.
 - 8.5. Council's digital assets, including external TV displays and Council's consultation platform Our Adelaide.
 - 8.6. 20,000 flyers were distributed to all properties in the city.
 - 8.7. 200 posters were distributed to city businesses for display (100 in English and 100 in Simplified Chinese).
- 9. Specific audiences were also targeted to seek feedback during the consultation period. This included:
 - 9.1. Over 9,000 direct emails to City of Adelaide ratepayers providing a link to the survey and information on how they could participate.
 - 9.2. Direct emails and letters (when emails were not available) to ratepayers potentially impacted by the introduction of a minimum rate of \$600.
 - 9.3. Direct emails to resident groups and precinct groups.
 - 9.4. Email newsletter sent to over 11,500 Our Adelaide subscribers in the first week of consultation, and inclusion in the Our Adelaide newsletter in the third week of consultation.
- 10. Numerous options for the community to provide comments were offered including:
 - 10.1. Hard copies of the survey available at various locations including the Customer Centre, libraries and community centres, along with provision of relevant documents for reference.
 - 10.2. Opportunities provided to request an in person meeting with Council staff to discuss and ask questions about the Draft 2025/26 BP&B.
 - 10.3. In person opportunities were available for the community to attend at the four Draft 2025/26 BP&B stalls, held at the Adelaide Central Market, North Adelaide, Rundle Mall and the City Library.
 - 10.4. A public hearing, as part of Council's ordinary meeting on Tuesday 27 May 2025, which was advertised on Council's website, Our Adelaide consultation page, the Government Gazette on 1 May 2025 and in the Advertiser on 2 May 2025.

Consultation Outcomes

- 11. A total of 210 pieces of feedback were received as part of the consultation. This was made up of 110 completed survey forms, 99 written submissions (emails and letters), and one verbal submission.
- 12. Some common themes emerged from the feedback received, which are summarised in the detailed summary and analysis of feedback contained in **Attachment A**.
- 13. The most prominent themes which emerged include:
 - 13.1. Rates (including proposed introduction of a minimum rate)
 - 13.2. Transport and parking
 - 13.3. Fees and charges (including parklets, outdoor dining and event road closures)
 - 13.4. Budget (including sponsorship to the Australia Day Council of South Australia)
 - 13.5. Projects
 - 13.6. Park Lands
 - 13.7. Subsidiaries
 - 13.8. Priorities
 - 13.9. Greening and environment

- 13.10. Economy and business
- 14. Copies of the feedback are provided in **Attachment B** (Our Adelaide surveys), **Attachment C** (written and verbal submissions) and **Attachment D** (in person feedback).
- 15. The Our Adelaide survey form asked about the level of support for the prioritised key actions, strategic projects, new and upgrade capital projects, proposed changes to the Rates Policy and proposed changes to fees and charges. The key findings based on the 110 completed forms are outlined below:
 - 15.1. 20.9% of respondents supported all the proposed Strategic Plan Key Actions prioritised for 2025/26, 62.7% supported some of the proposed Key Actions, 14.6% supported none of them and 1.8% did not provide a response.
 - 15.2. 17.3% of respondents supported all the proposed Strategic Projects, 58.2% supported some of the proposed projects, 13.6% supported none and 10.9% did not provide a response.
 - 15.3. 20.9% of respondents supported all the proposed New and Upgrade Capital projects for 2025/26, 53.7% supported some of the projects, 11.8% supported none of the projects and 13.6% did not provide a response.
 - 15.4. Respondents provided their opinion on the proposal to introduce a minimum rate in 2025/26. 27.3% agreed with the introduction of a proposed minimum rates, 26.3% were neutral, 38.2% disagreed and 8.2% did not provide a response to this question.
 - 15.5. Respondents provided their opinion on the changes to fees and charges for road closures of defined major roads during events for 2025/26. 30.9% agreed with Council's approach to road closure fees, 31.8% were neutral, 32.7% disagreed and 4.6% did not provide a response to the question.
 - 15.6. Additionally, respondents provided their opinion on the other changes to fees and charges for 2025/26. 14.6% supported all changes to fees and charges, 53.6% supported some of the changes, 24.5% supported none and 7.3% did not provide a response to the question.



Consultation on the City of Adelaide Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget (BP&B) and Rating Policy occurred between 6 May 2025 and 27 May 2025

During the consultation period, the Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget project page on Our Adelaide had 6,341 visits.

A total of 110 Our Adelaide survey forms, 99 written submissions (email or letter), and one verbal submission were received. We also engaged with approximately 95 community members through in person opportunities during the consultation period.










Attachment A - Consultation Summary DRAFT 2025/26 BUSINESS PLAN & BUDGET AND RATING POLICY

OUR ADELAIDE SURVEYS (110 responses)

Who did we hear from?

- 64.5% of respondents identified themselves as City of Adelaide ratepayers.
- People between 30 and 44 accounted for the largest age group (33.6%), followed by those aged between 45 and 59 (26.4%), and 60 to 74 (21.8%).
- Shop, work and play (leisure/recreation) were the main ways that respondents participated in city life.



Survey Results

Within the Our Adelaide survey, multiple-choice questions were asked to gauge the level of support for the proposed priorities, projects, and approach to rates and fees and charges.


Prioritised Strategic Plan Key Actions


Strategic Projects


New and Upgrades Capital Projects


Proposed Changes to Rate Policy


Proposed Changes to Fees and Charges

Survey Results

The responses to charging a daily rate for the closure of major roads were mixed. Those who disagreed accounted for the largest share at 32.7%. This was marginally higher than the proportion of respondents who felt neutral (31.8%), or agreed with the proposed changes (30.9%).




Proposed Changes to Fees and Charges (continued)

Survey Results

Over half (53.6%) of the respondents agreed with some of the other proposed changes to fees and charges and 24.5% did not agree with any of the proposed changes. Only 14.6% agreed to all the proposed changes and 7.3% did not provide a response.



Key Themes

In addition to the questions above, respondents to the Our Adelaide online survey also had the opportunity to provide the reasoning for their indicated level of support as well as provide further comments.

The written and verbal submissions, and in person feedback received outside of the Our Adelaide online community engagement platform covered various topics across the Draft 2025/26 BP&B as well as changes to the Rating Policy. There were common themes identified across all the responses received with the key themes outlined below.

Rates

Just over a quarter (28%) of the responses received related to rates. Of these responses, two-thirds (67%) were on the proposed introduction of a minimum rate with the majority indicating that they were against this initiative. Examples of the feedback received included that the properties potentially impacted by the minimum rate do not necessarily access services (such as bin collection), it would be expensive and would impact resale value.

One of the comments suggested that properties such as carparks or offices near each other should be rated as one, instead of paying the minimum rate multiple times. Other suggestions included reducing the minimum rate to a lower amount, staging the introduction over multiple years, potentially using it as a way of reducing car-centricity, and only applying it to some property types.

With regards to the proposed rate increase, 60% were against the level of the increase and an increase in rates in general. Comments received were related to the proposed rate increase being too high and that it should be in line with CPI (Consumer Price Index) or WPI (Wage Price Index). Responses also mentioned that the rate burden on residents should be reduced, and that the proposed rate increase would exacerbate the existing cost of living pressures. There were also comments that indicated dissatisfaction with the valuation method used for owner-occupiers.

Other comments mentioned reducing the rate cap to 5%, further increasing rates for vacant properties, parking lots and short stays, and introducing incentives or discounts for older residents, those who pay strata fees or have solar installations.

Transport and Parking

Approximately 21% of the responses related to transport and parking with an even split of feedback between the two topics. Most of the feedback related to parking (65%) were concerned with the loss of carparks, particularly on O'Connell and Hutt Streets. There were specific mentions of the potential impact on businesses, accessibility concerns of removing car parking, cost of parking, and that there should be more free parking.

Comments around transport indicated support for active transport modes and that more investment was required in infrastructure such as separated bike paths, an east-west bike path connection, high quality and wider footpaths, and raised pedestrian crossings. There were also comments on public transport such as investing in the extension of the tram network, introducing a rail connection to the hills, and for the City Loop to run more frequently and later in the evenings.

Fees and Charges

Approximately 17% of responses received related to fees and charges, predominantly on the topic of parklets and outdoor dining fees and the proposed changes to event road closure fees.

Majority of the feedback received in relation to parklets and/or outdoor dining fees indicated a lack understanding of the difference between outdoor dining and parklets, commentary on the benefits of parklets and outdoor dining and requests for reduced fees and a consistent fee structure for all parklets.

In terms of the comments around event road closure fees, most responses were against the proposed changes to the fee model with only some responses indicating support. Commentary was also made generally on increasing costs facing the events sector and concerns that it could reduce the number and duration of events.

Just under a third of the fees and charges responses (30%) provided general feedback on other fees and charges changes. These comments were related to the impacts of raising rates above CPI and its impact on community and businesses and concerns around fees charged to access information from Council e.g. access to archives.

Budget (including sponsorship to the Australia Day Council of South Australia)

Around 21% of responses related to the actual budget with most of the feedback received relating to the budget for the Australia Day Council of South Australia (ADCSA), with strong representation from ADCSA Board and Corporate Members captured in this theme. Feedback received also included general comments on reducing Council expenditure overall and opposition to specific budget reductions in Arts and Culture grant funding and Adelaide Prize funding.

Projects

Approximately 12% of responses related to the proposed projects in the budget with the majority of this feedback relating to capital projects. Comments focussed on support for specific projects such as Mainstreet Revitalisation, capital works renewals and Park Lands buildings. There were also suggestions for additional funding and new projects such as the undergrounding of powerlines, additional investment in the west end, and on housing and economy related projects. Comments that were not supportive of the projects proposed mentioned O'Connell Street and Hutt Street revitalisation projects, Light Square masterplan, and the One Market development. There were also comments on the length of time required to deliver projects and Council's ability to deliver complex projects.

Only a couple of the comments received were related to strategic projects.

Park Lands

Approximately 11% of responses related to the Park Lands with two-thirds of this feedback being on the topic Adelaide Park Lands Association submission. This submission mentioned a variety of issues such as:

- Concerns around the size/footprint of buildings in the Park Lands to be upgraded
- Disappointment in lack of progress in Helen Mayo Park
- Returning Park Land areas back to green space
- Concern with reduced expenditure on Park Lands maintenance
- Partnering with Adelaide Park Lands Association for greening in the Park Lands

The remaining responses indicated general support for the Park Lands including additional investment, ensuring the protection of the Park Lands by minimising the impact of development, and that the Park Lands remain usable by all and are not closed for events.

Subsidiaries

Approximately 8% of all responses were related to Council's subsidiaries with most of this focussed on support for additional funding for the Adelaide Economic Development Agency.

Priorities

Approximately 6% of responses related to the 2025/26 priorities. These comments were broadly supportive of the proposed priorities with specific mentions of electric vehicle charging, culture, housing and request for greater clarification on the actions that would deliver on the priorities.

Other Themes

There was also a small proportion (15%) of feedback on the topics of environment and greening, economy and business, and on the Draft BP&B document itself.

Comments related to the environment and greening indicated high levels of general support for environmental and greening investment and projects, with some mentioning increased funding.

Comments related to the economy and business were focused on direct support for small businesses and the potential impacts of increased rates and fees.

Feedback on the Draft BP&B document were related to having clearer and more detailed project information, presentation of rate information, providing more detail on the priorities, major projects, and Long-Term Financial Plan. This would provide additional context and would facilitate a better understanding of the long-term impact of the proposed budget.

Another 15% of the responses provided other general feedback and covered topics such as cleanliness and safety in the city.

The plan while raises some good points, does little to meaningfully change the quality of life of the city residents who actually pay rates.

Pedestrians are second class citizens in our own city, at pedestrian crossings we often have to wait for several traffic lights cycles to cross, eg light square crossing. Unprotected bike lanes are a waist of investment as they do very little to encourage people to cycle, and many studies have shown that improved bike and waking infrastructure increases business returns, as well improve air pollution.

Finally, heavy and oversized vehicles seriously reduce air quality, and dramatically deteriorate road safety. My wife and I are directly affected by this proposal, which will raise the rate currently charged on our Private Road 30A Marion Street Allot 48 DP 432 Assessment No 45357 1 by over 350 per cent. We are long-term occupants of 336 Halifax Street, a state heritage-listed property which has no rear access other than via this adjoining private road, which we acquired in 2023.

Contrary to the document 'Proposed changes as part of the Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget for consultation, Appendix A', this is not a Public Road, but a non-bitumenised unmade private road, without street lighting, or any council-provided services. Due to a number of existing public and private easements, it cannot be developed, and is used by us largely for the purpose of charging our electric car. (We have no other option for this purpose, as our house lacks a front drive and we cannot run a power cord to the car in Halifax Street). As self-funded retirees and long-term City of Adelaide owner-occupiers, we feel that the current proposed minimum rate is an excessively blunt and indiscriminate means of achieving a desired (and desirable) increase in Council revenue. We suggest that instead of such a massive one-off increase as we and other resident rate-payers are now facing, the minimum rate should be introduced over a period of time (say five years), in order to ease the financial pressure on residential owner-occupiers.

While I support the intent behind improving our city's streetscapes—and even appreciate some of the designs currently proposed—it's difficult to understand the overwhelming budget alignment toward multiple Mainstreet upgrades happening all at once.

The decision to have five streets simultaneously in design and/or construction phases, without a clear strategy for managing the broader road network, is concerning. This is especially problematic when considered alongside the River Torrens to Darlington (T2D) Project and the planned tram line upgrades, both of which are expected to significantly increase traffic pressure on city streets.

Additionally, Adelaide's growing calendar of road-based events and festivals—which is a fantastic part of our identity as a festival city—also contributes to temporary road closures and congestion. Layering major infrastructure works on top of this creates a perfect storm for gridlock, confusion, and frustration for residents, businesses, and visitors alike.

The City of Adelaide looks to promote a city that is culturally rich and offers unique experiences. AEDA talks about the desire for Adelaide to have a diverse range of tourism products and experiences that provide more reasons for people to visit and stay longer.

The daily road closure charges proposed do not serve that ambition well. Rather, they serve as a deterrent to event organisers, organisers who are already investing heavily to bring unique compelling experiences to the city. It is those experiences which drive hundreds of thousands of visitors to the City of Adelaide each year, which supports the CBD economy, which contribute to the cultural heartbeat of the city and which help define and tell the story of our city.

All event organisers and owners have been subjected to significant cost increases (at least 30%) and budget pressure in the past few years. They do not need further costs imposed on them. Costs for road closures will result in either events not closing the roads, which will impact growth, or in a reduced budget to apply to their events. As an example of the impact, for the Santos Tour Down Under it will have a \$24,000 impact. Instead of further costs, organisers need support from the City of Adelaide, which would encourage them to invest in the growth of the events they are delivering in a very competitive national landscape.

As both the Chair of the Major Events Group, and as the head of a number of major events (including Santos Tour Down Under, Tasting Australia and National Pharmacies Christmas Pageant) owned and delivered by the South Australian Tourism Commission, I ask the City of Adelaide to reconsider the implementation of these charges. Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback on the City of Adelaide's Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget.

The Adelaide Park Lands Association (APA) is pleased to note the inclusion of the following strategic priority:

"The status, attributes and character of our green spaces and the Park Lands are protected and strengthened."

Our members and supporters, many of whom are rate payers in the City of Adelaide, deeply value the Council's continued investment in managing the world's only Park with a city at its centre.

However, we are concerned that, unlike previous years, the draft budget does not clearly identify a specific allocation for the ongoing maintenance of the Adelaide Park Lands. While \$7.7 million is listed under "Park Lands, Policy and Sustainability" within the City Shaping portfolio, this appears significantly lower than the \$22.89 million allocated in the previous financial year.

If these figures are directly comparable, this would represent an alarming two-thirds reduction in funding for Park Lands maintenance - a prospect that would be deeply disappointing.

Sporting Facility Upgrades

The proposed investment of \$10 million—including 1.5% of rates revenue—toward new and upgraded sporting facilities in Mary Lee Park (Park 27B) and Golden Wattle Park / Mirnu Wirra (Park 21W) is a significant commitment. While we recognise the need to improve infrastructure to support growing participation, particularly among women and girls, there remains uncertainty around the scale and features of these developments.

There is a delicate balance between:

- Providing upgraded facilities that may include corporate-style amenities (meeting rooms, bars, private spaces), and
- Ensuring public interest in "free and unrestricted access to and use of the Park Lands" a
 core objective of the APA Constitution.

The draft budget lacks clarity on the nature of the proposed developments. We urge the Council to ensure that any upgrades do not compromise public access or over-commercialise public green space.

Helen Mayo Park Master Plan

It is disappointing to see that, despite funding being allocated in last year's budget, no progress has been made on the \$250,000 State-funded Master Plan for Helen Mayo Park. The lack of advancement on improving connectivity between the riverbank and upper levels of the park is a missed opportunity to enhance public use of this space.

Ambiguity Around Re-Greening Commitments

On page 17, the draft budget outlines a commitment to:

"Work with partners to create innovative ways to create or convert underutilised areas to green space."

This aligns with the draft Park Lands Management Strategy *Towards 2036*, which identified eight bitumen-covered sites as high-priority locations for return to open green public space within 1–5 years.

While \$2.232 million has been earmarked under the "Public Realm Greening Program" (page 60), it is unclear whether any of this is intended for the Park Lands sites identified in *Towards 2036*.

Since 2020, APA has made repeated attempts to partner with the City of Adelaide to progress a re-greening project on the Park Lands—most recently detailed <u>here</u>. We sincerely hope this year's budget enables at least one project to proceed on these underutilised sites.

We would welcome the opportunity to co-develop and coordinate a re-greening initiative in collaboration with Council and other partners.

Adelaide Recreation Circuit

For several years, APA has advocated for a feasibility study into the Adelaide Recreation Circuit—a proposed unbroken, illuminated walking, running, and cycling trail around the Park Lands. This concept has the potential to be a landmark tourism and lifestyle asset and has received strong support from the business and sporting communities.

In 2022, then-Opposition Leader Peter Malinauskas committed to investigating the idea. Despite raising the concept directly with the Premier (September 2023) and the Planning Minister (April 2024), no funding has yet been committed.

We urge the Council to allocate funds toward a feasibility study and pursue this initiative in partnership with the State Government.

Thank you again for the opportunity to contribute to this important consultation. We remain committed to working constructively with the City of Adelaide to ensure the Park Lands remain an accessible, vibrant, and sustainable space for all.

Dear Lord Mayor, Councillors, and the Council Administration,

The Property Council welcomes the opportunity to provide a response to the City of Adelaide's <u>Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget</u> on behalf of its South Australian members. As an industry body, we recognise the importance of setting key targets to improve and grow our Central Business District by attracting more capital, residents, and businesses.

The Property Council of Australia is the leading advocate for Australia's largest industry – property. Property Council member organisations are investors, owners, developers, builders, and managers of real estate across all major asset classes including commercial, office, residential, industrial, retirement communities, hotels, purpose-built student accommodation and more.

We understand the City of Adelaide is seeking feedback on its proposed Budget, with economic recovery, infrastructure investment, and sustainable growth among its top priorities outlined in the Plan. These priorities reflect a commitment to a thriving, future focused Adelaide.

The Property Council also notes the City's targets include a **general rates revenue increase of 5.6% in fees and charges** from Adelaide's commercial and residential ratepaying base. However, in the face of rapid global change and increasing competition between cities for talent, investment and innovation, we encourage the Council to take bolder action in several key areas. Specifically, we urge Council to:

- 1. Accelerate approvals and prioritise development activity
- 2. Explore and incentivise further options to support housing delivery
- 3. Re-evaluate the sustainability of its revenue model
- 4. Increase investment in economic development through the Adelaide Economic Development Agency (AEDA).

Accelerate approvals and prioritise development activity

The Council's capacity to drive economic growth depends on the speed, certainty, and clarity of its planning and approvals system. A faster, more predictable approvals pathway is essential to unlocking private investment, creating jobs, stimulating the economy and achieving population growth targets.

We urge the Council to adopt an expanded, fast-tracked approvals process, particularly for multi-storey, shovel-ready developments that align with the Council's strategic objectives. Prioritising projects ready to proceed will help activate underutilised land, generate employment, bolster investor confidence and broaden the rate base.

To strengthen collaboration between the Council and the property sector, we recommend establishing a dedicated body to assess and prioritise development activity. This body should be led by the Adelaide Economic Development Agency (AEDA), with appropriate budget support from the Council to ensure its effective implementation.

Explore and incentivise further options to support housing delivery

While the City's ARCHI program is a positive step, its current scale and take-up is insufficient to meet the Council's target of 50,000 residents in the CBD by 2036. A target of 50 dwellings per year is far too low and much more needs to be done to deliver the required supply, choice and diversity of housing the city requires.

We encourage the Council to:

- Identify and prioritise unlocking underutilised Council assets, such as car parks, vacant lots and ageing assets at the end of their useful life for housing.
- Partner with the private sector to accelerate the delivery of social, affordable, and market housing.
- Formally Partner with the Property Council to explore further planning incentives and funding mechanisms to support residential development in the CBD and inner precincts.

Re-evaluate the sustainability of its revenue model

The proposed 5.6% rate increase – well above CPI and following several years of cumulative rises well above CPI – is undermining Adelaide's competitiveness as an investment destination. The current over-reliance on commercial ratepayers is unsustainable.

Indeed, earlier this year, the Essential Services Commission of South Australia (ESCOSA) forecasted the City of Adelaide's future financial status as 'potentially unsustainable', outlining the status quo untenable revenue model.

We recommend the City:

- Diversify revenue streams to reduce pressure on businesses.
- Undertake an independent review of Council expenditure, with the aim of identifying efficiencies and delivering cost savings.
- Curb growth in non-essential operating costs, particularly given the 15% rise in Employee Costs over the past two years.¹
- Focus on population growth to broaden the ratepayer base and improve revenue sustainability.

Prioritising Investment in Economic Development through AEDA

AEDA is central to driving innovation, entrepreneurship, and industry collaboration. Its support for startups, innovation precincts, and knowledge sector partnerships strengthens Adelaide's position in future industries such as defence, clean energy, and advanced manufacturing.

It is imperative that the Council adopt a step change from the current status quo. Since the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic, the proportion of council rates revenue allocated to AEDA has declined—even as the business community continues to shoulder the overwhelming majority of the financial burden. In fact, approximately 80% of the City's rates revenue is contributed by non-residential ratepayers.

Given this substantial investment, the Property Council strongly recommends that 10% of total rates revenue be allocated to AEDA to ensure it can continue delivering strategic outcomes for the business community and driving Adelaide's broader economic prosperity.

We support increased budget allocation for AEDA to:

- Scale up innovation precincts and startup support.
- Strengthen industry/university collaborations.
- Drive skilled migration through targeted national and international promotion.
- Lead the proposed public-private coordination committee to identify barriers to development and streamline engagement.

Investment in AEDA is an investment in a globally connected, high-tech, welcoming and thriving, social, cultural and economically strong Adelaide.

Leveraging Infrastructure to Enable Private Sector Investment

City of Adelaide	Business	Plan	and	Budget	2024/	25
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The proposed \$107 million infrastructure investment is a welcome commitment to city revitalisation. We commend the focus on key precincts—Gouger, Hindley, Hutt, and Melbourne Streets—but stress the importance of close alignment with private development pipelines to maximise return on investment.

It is also worth noting here that the Property Council strongly welcomes the announcement of LIV Golf's move to the North Adelaide Golf Course. Dear City of Adelaide

We write in response to the **City of Adelaide Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget** that shows a strategic partnership grant to our organisation to the sum of \$100,000 FY25/26.

This is a significant reduction from \$182,000 in previous years for the delivery of the vital and deeply valued activities on 26 January at Elder Park, City of Adelaide.

We note the budget papers do not record a previous funding figure, nor that ADCSA has a long-term strategic partnership to deliver on behalf of the City, the ceremony and activities on Australia Day.

We respectfully request the full figure of \$182,000 be reinstated in the final 2025/26 Budget, to remain aligned with the enduring and trusted strategic partnership between the City of Adelaide and the Australia Day Council of SA (ADCSA).

The loss of this significant funding will have a range of highly impactful ramifications on the City of Adelaide, the South Australian community and ADCSA as a small for-purpose organisation, as detailed below along with vital background context:

- The free 2025 community program comprising of a Smoking Ceremony in the morning, Intercultural Parade and Official Ceremony including a much loved cultural concert and fireworks in Elder Park attracted over 30,000 attendees
- Historically ADCSA took on the responsibility for delivering the 26 January program and event on behalf of the City, with the commitment ADCSA would receive funding through a multi-year strategic partnership agreement that enabled stable support and longer-term planning for this vital ceremony.
- Major capital cities across Australia deliver their own commemorative and iconic events on 26 January, as do South Australian local governments.
- City of Adelaide Strategic Funding Partnership funding has NOT been increased by cpi; and in 2020 was reduced
 from a multi-year agreement to only a one-year agreement, removing the stability and capacity
 for longer range planning. This remains a particular risk in light of the high cost to delivering quality events.

- Since the inception of the strategic partnership ADCSA has successfully leveraged funding from the federal
 government through the National Australia Day Council (NADC) Capital City grant funding. This funding is
 dependent (and will be decreased) in direct alignment commensurate with the value of the funding received
 from the City of Adelaide.
- Funding through NADC also specifically requires financial and partnership commitment from the City of Adelaide, as part of the criteria.
- Supplementing revenue for Aus Lights on the River through sponsorship etc has reached its limit due to the cultural and political sensitivities, making the grant funding through the City of Adelaide crucial.

This significant reduction in City of Adelaide funding will have the following dire implications with a range of considerations:

- Funding from other grant sources will be significantly reduced, in direct alignment to the value of funding received from the City of Adelaide, creating further reduction to the overall program.
- Should the proposed \$82,000 reduction in funding occur:
 - Mourning in the Morning Smoking Ceremony may be cancelled. It is a stand-alone program that if cancelled will have little or no impact on the rest of the program.
 - Mourning in the Morning Smoking Ceremony is curated by a First Nations lead and engages all First Nations performers and speakers. The ceremony is curated in consultation with the Open Circle Group of Kaurna elders with months of development prior to the ceremony on 26 January. This ceremonial program is authentically First Nations led, and offers greater awareness of First Nations culture to the wider community and constituents.
- Without the full support from the City of Adelaide with funding to the value of \$182,000 this program cannot meet the City of Adelaide's Reconciliation Action Plan's objectives.

The **City of Adelaide's Reconciliation Action Plan 2024-2027** embodies the principles of respect, relationship-building, and opportunity creation that strives to progress First Nations employment, and an intensified focus on Kaurna engagement and support through innovation, collaboration and transparency.

"The City of Adelaide's vision is for a community where the rich heritage of the Kaurna People and the diverse cultures of all Aboriginal & Torres Strait Peoples are honoured, embraced, and fully integrated into a shared future for the city: One that is steeped in Kaurna tradition and belonging to the Yarta, with a strong, harmonious and reconciled community".

Cutting ADCSA's funding by \$82,000 for the program on 26 January, and the subsequent ramifications, challenge the City of Adelaide's unwavering dedication to reconciliation as leaders within Local Government for more than 20 years.

We respectfully request the current City of Adelaide 2025/2026 funding to ADCSA remain at \$182,000 to enable our deeply valued strategic partnership to continue serving all constituents, telling the story of all of who we are as Australians.

In summary, ADCSA's vision is for a connected community of inspired leaders who contribute to Australia's future while upholding Australian values. By amplifying diverse national stories, including those of First Nations peoples and migrants, we strive to foster a thriving, unified nation. Our efforts are centred on reconciliation, celebrating unity, and addressing contemporary issues by bringing communities together.

Your support towards this vision, and that of City of Adelaide's through an enduring multi-year strategic partnership agreement for \$182,000 per annum would continue to deliver highly impactful and high-profile outcomes for the City.

Business Events Adelaide appreciates the opportunity to comment on City of Adelaide's Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget (the Plan) on behalf of its members. As a Strategic Partner of the Adelaide Economic Development Agency (AEDA), and a major contributor to the City through the attraction of domestic and global business events, it is well placed to comment on the challenges and opportunities outlined in the Plan.

Business Events Adelaide works over the horizon to fill City venues and hotels in future years. Our members also include restaurants, bars and retailers, many of whom are City traders and ratepayers. In the last full financial year (FY24) Business Events Adelaide secured 174 business events which delivered \$336 million in economic benefit to the City. In its midyear report to AEDA (dated 20 January 2025) Business Events Adelaide advised that a further 70 business events, worth \$540 million, had been secured. The return on investment to AEDA and the City from its \$300,000 investment at that point was an incredible \$1800:1, and more wins have since been confirmed.

Success has been built on positioning Adelaide as a vibrant, safe and modern City, with cutting edge facilities and expertise in a range of economically complex sectors. We appreciate the trade-offs that Council has to consider when balancing its budget, however economic growth and investment attraction are fundamental elements that will allow the City to prosper. Of the Plan's ten priorities, two are pertinent to this aim:

- Reinforcing the position of Adelaide as the State's central business district and amplifying Adelaide's reputation as a place to learn, work and start a business.
- Providing services and information that contribute towards a high productivity economy.

Council endorsed its Economic Development Strategy during the past year, and that Strategy contains a number of ambitious aspirations. AEDA was allocated a good portion of the responsibilities to deliver on the Strategy, however this not reflected in the budget. As a result, we are concerned initiatives to grow businesses and further build off the City's innovation hubs will not be achieved.

It is our opinion that the level of funding allocated to AEDA to take a lead role in progressing these important priorities is insufficient. This will consequently have a significant impact on the City and its businesses.

Of further relevance to *Business Events Adelaide* is the opportunity to progress a coherent green agenda. Adelaide is positioned at the forefront of environmentally progressive measures and attracts a significant number of business events related to clean energy generation. The prospect of hosting COP 31 in November 2026 represents a unique opportunity to further showcase Adelaide's credentials and has the potential to transform our City's profile on the global stage. We feel that the Plan as it currently stands risks squandering the potential benefits of COP – both in regard to COP itself but more importantly the increased exposure that will result from it.

We urge the Council to consider increasing its funding for AEDA so these important parts of the Economic Development Strategy can be delivered effectively.

Carpark 41D, 17 Eden Street, Adelaide SA 5000

This is a basement car park within a strata complex, used solely for residential vehicle parking. It was placed on a separate title by the original developer but is functionally part of a residential dwelling. The car park receives no rubbish collection, no council maintenance, and no active council services. The only conceivable service provided is stormwater management in the event of major rain.

For the current financial year, I paid \$221.65. Under the proposed policy, this would rise to \$600—an increase of approximately 170%. This is vastly disproportionate when compared to the 5.6% average rate increase proposed for most existing ratepayers.

The SECRA committee welcomes the opportunity to respond to the City of Adelaide's **Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget: Building our city's future.**

What actions by Council will encourage people to move to the city, but will also retain those who currently enjoy living here?

- 1. Greening city streets and spaces. Providing shade trees along walking and cycling paths, in particular, in Victoria Park/Pakapakanthi.
- Park Lands that are accessible, unfenced, and well-maintained for individual and family activity, and for engaging with nature, as well as for sporting groups and, SECRA suggests, limited commercial use. Large scale commercial events lead to an annual cycle of degradation and then time-consuming repair.
- Sufficient funding for horticultural and biodiversity teams to increase and then
 maintain greening in streets and green spaces, in particular, in the Adelaide Park
 Lands.
- 4. A transparent and equitable planning system where people can see what could be built next to, or near them in the future. SECRA advocates for the removal of catalyst site provisions which lead to uncertainty and anxiety.
- 5. Housing is primarily a State government responsibility, but the city needs a variety of housing options, both for purchase and for rental.

6.

- a. Long-term financial sustainability, given the current economic situation.
- b. Planned and funded renewal of all assets, particularly the large ones such as the Morphett Street Bridge and Torrens Weir
- c. That the Council stop pursuing significant capital projects with a high element of risk that is more suited to the private sector, such as Central Market and 88 O'Connell Street developments, particularly as much of the information about these projects is deemed to be 'commercial in confidence' and not available to ratepayers.
- 7. Adequate protection for the heritage and character of the city.

- 8. Streets that allow safe active transport options such as walking, cycling, and e-scootering, with material separating people who cycle or use e-scooters or other small wheel devices from pedestrians and from motor vehicles
- 9. Traffic speeds reduced to 40kmh, or, on narrow streets where you can't walk on the footpath because of Stobie poles, waste bins, sandwich boards and the press of other pedestrians, to 30kmh.
- More street benches on walking routes, such as Frome Road, where older walkers can rest.
- 11. At intersections where lanes and minor roads meet more significant roads, pedestrian crossing points should be raised to the level of the footpath (as suggested by Jan Gehl).
- 12. Clean, well-maintained, well-lit streets. SECRA thanks Civil Construction, Public Realm staff for their work in identifying potential trip hazards on footpaths and removing them. Gang Four has been doing this in Halifax Street.
- 13. Thriving businesses that cater for residents (supermarkets big and small, pharmacies) as well as for workers and visitors.
- 14. Community strengthening services such as the Connector bus (linking communities), with timetables which extend further into the evening, and which are more frequent during weekends (29% of city households do not own a car, compared with 7% in Greater Adelaide). The current timetable favours worker visitors rather than city residents. Bus shelters at Halifax/Hutt Street intersection stops.
- 15. Support for libraries (in particular, the Hutt Street library), Community Centres (in particular, the Box Factory Community Centre and the Minor Works building), and art and cultural opportunities.
- 16. First Nations recognition/initiatives

Hutt Street Revitalisation

This project seems to illustrate the stop and start nature of much planning in the City. A Hutt Street Concept Plan was developed, based on many months of consultation by Council of businesses and residents through the Lord Mayor's Round Table. As the SECRA committee understands it, (two SECRA committee members were involved in the Lord Mayor's Round Table), there was general agreement on, and enthusiasm for, what was needed to revitalize the street, in particular what was needed by businesses – more outdoor dining opportunities, more greening, slowing of through traffic, separated bike lanes to encourage people to come to cafes and restaurants and linger in the street.

The Concept Plan, presumably based on how revitalization of other 'high streets' have benefited business and residents, was developed by Council staff and presented to

Council in December 2021. Substantial funding was applied for and granted. By December 2024 all was ready.

What happened?

The loss of some parking generated fear and anxiety among some (most?) businesses and some (fewer?) local residents. SECRA doesn't have the data on this. Council staff then supplied four other options (some of which will make little difference to the street) to join the initial design (now known as Option D), and asked residents and local businesses, and others – including people who have no connection with Hutt Street, and the neighbourhood - to vote on all five.

What kind of a process is this? One, SECRA would suggest, that inspires no confidence in the ability of the Council to lead us confidently into the future.

The SECRA committee encourages SECRA members to make their own submissions to this consultation.

The Epworth Building offers a distinctive contribution to the commercial office leasing market by providing micro office spaces—starting from just 16sqm—specifically tailored to meet the needs of start-ups and sole traders. These spaces are offered at highly accessible rates, encouraging individuals to move away from working from home and instead establish a presence in the CBD.

Dear City of Adelaide City Council,

I am writing to express my firm opposition to the proposed \$600 minimum council rate for any parcel of land, including individual car park bays. I urge the council to terminate consideration of this proposal as it represents an unfair and economically damaging levy on property owners.

This increase would disproportionately affect strata-titled car park owners, many of whom own small individual lots. The additional \$600 per annum translates to a \$27.20 monthly increase per bay, adding substantial costs without any enhancement in services or infrastructure.

Car park bays already shoulder significant holding costs, including:

- Emergency Services Levy
- SA Water Rates
- Council Rates (on a per-bay basis)

Introducing this minimum rate would equate to an over 100% increase in council rates for assets that neither utilise most council services nor have the capacity for value-add growth to absorb these additional costs. In practical terms, this would force car park owners to increase parking fees—passing the burden onto consumers, discouraging city visits, and harming local business foot traffic.

I respectfully request that this proposed rate increase be withdrawn from consideration entirely. The negative economic impacts on property owners, local businesses, and the broader community far outweigh any potential short-term revenue gains.



Re: Sturt Street/West Terrace Safety Measures

Kidical Mass Adelaide was established in 2022 as a grassroots movement advocating for safer streets for families who ride bikes. Our volunteer organisers are passionate parents, grandparents, and avid bike riders who want to see active transport become safer and more accessible to children and families in Adelaide. Our asks and priorities reflect our demand for action from decision makers to realise our vision.

Kidical Mass Adelaide has been working with the Sturt Street Community School and local stakeholders to highlight the safety issues at the West Terrace/Sturt Street intersection.

At its meeting on 14 May 2024, Council received our 'Petition – Upgrades to the Intersection of West Terrace and Sturt Street' signed by 233 signatories. The Council subsequently requested that the Administration prepare a report to investigate upgrading the intersection. At the 17 September 2024, the Infrastructure and Public Works Committee heard the Administration's response, which included a commitment to presenting options to Council for further consideration and endorsement through the 2025/2026 Business Plan and Budget process, to enable further design development, detailed traffic modelling, detailed cost estimation and further consultation with DIT and other key stakeholders.

We have reviewed the recently released City of Adelaide Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget and note that no commitments have been made to address the issues identified in our petition.

Over 400 people attended our 2024 Demonstration Ride, which included Sturt Street and West Terrace to highlight support for actions to address safety. We have held annual demonstration rides for four years to call on decision makers to commit to creating better streets.

We note that many strategies commit our decision makers to outcomes such as increasing the number of people commuting by bike, reducing carbon emissions, and creating places for people.

However, the action required to achieve these outcomes is hamstrung by inadequate budget commitments and an indulgence of harmful and inaccurate narratives, including the idea that a commitment to safe infrastructure and slower speeds will harm economic outcomes.

Evidence clearly demonstrates that pedestrians, cyclists and public transport users spend 40% more than motorists in local shops, and that investing in better walking and cycling infrastructure on a street decreases rental vacancies by up to 17%. (Source: Transport for London 2022).

There is less than a 10 percent risk that somebody walking will be killed at an impact speed of 30km/h but a 90 percent risk at 50km/h. (Source: 30 Please Campaign).

We urge our decision makers to commit to evidence-based decision making.

As someone who has worked, owned a number of businesses and lived in the city, for 25 years, I consider myself well versed on the effects of Council's decisions on retailers, small business owners and making the city an enjoyable place to visit.

Today, people come to the city primarily for work or study.

Twentyfive years ago, the city was the ultimate place to go shopping and U-Park was \$2.00 per hour. Why would anyone come into the city to shop when car parking is so expensive. This can be seen very clearly in the proposed re-purposing of the David Jones building and Myer Department Store's exit.

While the current Lord Mayor is the driving force behind "the renewal" of the city, she should not dictate and override "the Elected Members". That is not her role.

The 'elected members' held a vote on increasing rates. The decision reached was '8% over the next three years', I believe. However, this decision is not being followed by the Rates Department under the watchful eye of the CEO. My experience is that some rates in my property have spiked up to 30% in one financial year alone.

The notion that Council froze rates over Covid is completely untrue for commercial property (unless my holdings are being treated in a different manner). The rates continued to increase every year.

I feel strongly that rates should not be increased at all. The notion of setting a minimum rate on property I would have thought is not permitted 'under the Act', however as I am not a lawyer, my opinion is that the Council should stop being so greedy....and that is 100% what it is. Stop driving businesses out of the city by further increasing rates. No one cares about another 900 trees planted or James place being upgraded or many other meaningless activities.

The upgrade of Gawler Place for \$30mil plus, did absolutely nothing to the economy of the city. Having planter boxes with flowers like in Sydney would have been better and cheaper.

Council are literally driving small retailers out of the city, as landlords generally pass rates along.

Your report also states of vacancy rates being extremely low. This is untrue. They are low in A and A+ buildings, but the majority of property is B and C grade. There is a huge vacancy in offices and especially in retail, and it is getting worse.

This great big renewal project is totally unnecessary and can be slowly accomplished when Council earns millions of dollars from their market project.

The notion of spending many millions of dollars upgrading various parklands, is not necessary. The parklands are barely used and dry up to a crisp in the summer months. Nor will this spend see an increase in economic activity in the city. Why not have electronic counters to check how much they are used (though not the counters used to justify the mall's foot traffic which is simply people crossing a main street. If the Mall was so viable as a 'place to shop', then the turn over of retailers would not be so high.

In conclusion, I consider it wrong to impose the minimum rate of \$600.00 on rateable areas. Council have not been clear as to whether the imposed Rundle Mall Levy and Landscape Levy are in addition to the \$600 or inclusive.

It is mandatory that Council employees respect the views of the elected members, whether they like them or not.

Council should be handing out incentives to small businesses rather than penalising them with more and more fees (rates) if they choose to stay.

Introduction

We refer to the City of Adelaide Letter of 16 May 2015 inviting feedback on a proposed change to its Rating Policy to introduce a minimum rate of \$600 on every property in the City of Adelaide (copy enclosed).

That proposal, certainly in relation to our property referred to later, is grossly unfair and unreasonable, and is entirely opposed.

Our Property

Our property is a carpark, a copy of our current rates notice so acknowledges (copy enclosed). It is 2.13 metres wide and 6.15 metres long.

It was purchased in 2015 for \$20,000.00.

We have not had time since the receipt of your letter of 16 May 2025 to be advised of its current value. However, the annual general rate currently charged is \$189.70, where your proposal is to charge in excess of three times that general rate. It is grossly unfair and unreasonable.

Local Government Act 1999

We have not had time since receipt of your letter to fully consider the applicable Act parameters for the City of Adelaide proposal, and intend to seek legal advice if necessary.

However we make the following, hopefully correct, observations and requests.

- 1. The rates are to be based on the value of the land.
- 2. The rates notice is indecipherable. What is the current Valuer General's valuation? Please provide us with that information.
- 3. Before a rate change the City of Adelaide must prepare a Report. Please provide a copy as soon as possible.

- 4. Please provide a copy of the City of Adelaide newspaper publication of a notice of the intended change, inviting on at least 21 days notice of a public meeting and to make written submissions in relation to the proposed change of rates.
- 5. Please provide a copy of the City of Adelaide's annual business plan for the financial year in which the proposed rates change is to occur.

These observations may be incomplete.

Conclusion

In relation to our position, the proposal is grossly unfair and unreasonable, and is entirely opposed.

Please refer to our requests quickly.

As Managing Agents, we are writing on behalf of the Landlord to express our strong opposition to the proposed minimum rates charge of \$600 per site, an increase from the current average of \$450. This significant jump does not align with the current commercial market realities and will place undue financial pressure on landlords.

The proposed increase of \$150 per site, or 33%, is substantial and disproportionate. In the current economic climate, many commercial properties are experiencing stagnant or even declining rental yields. An abrupt rise in fixed costs like rates will directly erode profitability, making it challenging for landlords to maintain their properties and, in some cases, even cover their expenses.

Market Conditions

We hereby submit feedback in relation to the proposal to introduce a minimum rate of \$600 rates per property.

We currently have three properties identified as paying less than the proposed minimum threshold of \$600 per annum.

The three properties that will be affected are -

- Level 1 Office 1 14 Flinders, current per annum \$332.45
- Level 1 Office 2 14 Flinders, current per annum \$345
- Level 1 Office 3 14 Flinders, current per annum \$313.70

The total annual fee being \$991.15 per annum.

If the proposed threshold was imposed, at \$600 per annum per office, the annual fee would be \$1800. This is an increase of \$808.85 per annum, or an 81% increase.

It should be noted that the three offices affected are in fact, very small and located next to each other along one small corridor of 10m, with two adjoining offices being rented by the same person. They are also on the fist floor and there is no lift access to the offices.

The impact of this policy would result in these offices being too expensive to lease by the current tenants as they do not offer commercially competitive rental options. It could also be seen to limit rental by new tenants. In both instances this would deprive the church of income of approximately \$6000 per annum, and without capacity to relet these spaces.

We strongly urge that the Council review this policy in light of the smaller organisations that will be disadvantaged by this proposal. In the case of Pilgrim Uniting Church, we work to support the most vulnerable in our community, and this will again hinder our ability to provide support every Sunday night of the year to up to 100 people at a sit down 3 course meal.

DRAFT 2025/26 BUSINESS PLAN AND BUDGET - CONSULTATION

The North Adelaide Society (**TNAS**) has a diverse membership (>200) and a long history of advocacy and support for heritage, planning, and civic responsible governance that enables substantive community participation and consultation, and issue-focussed discussion by decision-makers.

The City of Adelaide (**CoA**; **Council**) has diverse precincts, neighbourhoods and communities (economic, business, cultural, societal, residential), visitors, and environs. Its budget management should reflect the contemporary and foreseeable needs of that diversity. Importantly, it needs to respect, protect and conserve the heritage, culture, environs and humanity of a walkable humanistic City of Adelaide within iconic, but regrettably shrinking, verdant publicly accessible Park Lands.

- 1. The framework for **consultation** included on the CoA webpage is noted.¹
- There is a lack of clarity and definition in the language of the draft, which omits a lexicon or glossary of terminology. That undermines interpretation and commonality of understanding.

For example, the use of "city" within the context of the CoA is both vague and ambiguous. The *City* of Adelaide as a local government entity embodies a greater diversity of contexts than generally applies to other local government entities which likewise are a City of [name]. The CoA has governance responsibility for the macro functional elements of a capital city of a state, as well as the diverse micro functional elements at a local (precinct/neighbourhood) level. The latter is too often set aside, diminished or consumed by grandeur notions for the former. Similarly, the Central Business District is <u>not</u> the 'City Square Mile' bounded by the Terraces.

City, CoA, CBD, Square Mile are expressions about which there ought to be clarity of meaning and intent, and consistency of use to ensure certainty and understanding in their application and interpretation.

The "City Plan – Adelaide 2036" seeks to spatially identify what it perceives as the "CBD". Its Glossary (p. 224) includes: "The Central Business District (CBD) in the context of the City of Adelaide is generally the area between North Terrace and Angas Street/Gouger Street and between East and West Terraces that includes the core commercial, retail, institutional and cultural functions of the city." ²

The subject of current public discussion exemplifies a consequence of definitional failure and misapprehension. It is incredulous and a gross planning perversity that a 38 storey office block rising 160m is proposed <u>not</u> in the "CBD", but rather in the "Adelaide Cultural Precinct" (cf. "<u>Our Adelaide Our Future City Plan – Adelaide 2036</u>") to the north of North Terrace, positioned to dominate and loom over National Heritage Places and be at odds with the National Heritage Listed Adelaide City Layout; a disgraceful travesty if it eventuates, and a travesty <u>not</u> contemplated in "Our Adelaide Our Future City Plan – Adelaide 2036".

- 3. The draft budget should be clear about its intent vis a vis budget and expenditure priorities in relation to contemporary and foreseeable needs related to the CBD (business, retail, commerce), culture/cultural/visitor experience, residential amenity and liveability, and societal/social and environmental contexts, essential hard and saft infrastructure (contemporary and anticipated) as well as internal corporate expenditures and productivity improvements.
- 4. Notions of 'bold' and 'aspirational' within utterances of public governance can generally be associated with receipt and expenditure of other people's monies, incomplete accountability, and are reminiscent of misplaced **governmental puffery** and descriptors such as 'transformative health' and 'protect the parklands'.
- The draft budget does **not identify** the 2024-25 budget priorities and outcomes from expenditures and anticipated or unforeseen risks; nor the extent to which the draft 2025-26 budget will continue, alter or desist from prior priorities.
- 6. Improvements have been made to the **content and presentation** of the draft Budget; that is commendable. Further improvement in the format, content and nature of detail that is included in state or federal budgets would facilitate clarity, albeit that the budget of a capital city local governance body will be less complex. Adoption or increased similarity in format would be instructive of the prior year's expenditure, targets and outcomes; whether the matter or purpose is to be further resourced; the resources to be allocated; and the forward estimated costs.

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² That is more expansive than the current precincts in the Planning and Design Code, which is understandable given the intent of the "City Plan – Adelaide 2036". It is noteworthy that in that future vision there is no contemplation by the CoA of a 38 storey (160m) office building being proposed to be ungraciously 'politically plonked' into the "Adeliade Cultural Precinct".

Annual Priorities

- 7. The "10 Key Actions" identified as "**Annual Priorities**" are:
 - Supporting increased residential growth and housing affordability.
 - Celebrating and elevating our community culture and multicultural communities by creating welcoming programs and services.
 - Making electric vehicle charging available for all users to improve Council and community performance on transport emissions.
 - Creating innovative ways to create or convert underutilised areas to green space.
 - Reinforcing the position of Adelaide as the State's central business district and amplifying Adelaide's reputation as a place to learn, work and start a business.
 - Providing services and information that contribute towards a high productivity economy.
 - Increasing active and diverse transport measures to ensure all City users can safely and easily move within the city.
 - Encouraging repurposing and adaptive reuse of buildings and facilities.
 - Creating, maintaining and integrating plans and policies that reflect and guide decision making to support our city and community to thrive
 - Attracting and retaining people with skills and behaviours which align with our organisational objectives and values.
- 7.1 These are expressed in the language of **objectives rather than actions**. Many may be capable of support in the abstract or simply state the obvious. However, what *action* will deliver those objectives is not indicated. Nor is there information about the staffing and expenditure resources allocated to their delivery, the expected outcomes, or whether the "action" was previously resourced and what was the outcome.

For example, the 2024-25 plan included:

- Support increased residential growth and housing affordability through partnerships and advocacy.
- Reduce rental pressures by increasing housing supply and unlocking properties for long-term tenants.
- Support belonging through an inclusive and welcoming community that recognises diversity and enables people of all abilities living, working and visiting the city.

There is no detail of funding provided and expended in 2024-25, if any, nor what outcomes resulted. There is nothing indicated; transparency is absent.

Strategic Projects

- 8. "The Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget includes \$7.146m of **Strategic Projects**." They are described at "pages 25-56 of the Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget." That is, some 26 pages (of 127) are allocated to describing \$7.146m expenditure (of \$286.754m).
- 8.1 However, those pages address the organisational structure and expenditure (2024-25 & 2025-26). For some areas, some "strategic projects" and "capital project" expenditure is referred to but without any indicated purpose or detail.
- 8.2 Absent useful information about the proposed "strategic projects", it is not possible to make any sensible comment, save to note the absence of substantive information.

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8.3 City and urban planning is a key strategic capability and function of the CoA and the Council. Together with the Planning and Design Code, they are matters of considerable community importance. The Code affects liveability; epitomises the uncertainty and vagaries of 'performance-based planning and assessment'; and imperils heritage, character, neighbourhoods and localities (incl. main streets). In that regard, it is not clear whether or what funding is allocated to currently contemplated CoA code amendment processes and future such matters that will invariably arise concerning planning and assessment within the CoA.

New & Upgrade Capital Projects

- 9. "The Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget includes \$39.179m of **New and Upgrade Capital Projects** ... on pages 58 60 of the Draft 2025/26 Business Plan
 and Budget." They are described as "new and upgrade" \$39.179m or "renewal"
 \$67.937m.
- 9.1 Obviously, infrastructure improvement and maintenance is critically important. What, why, when, how and with what priority are more vexed questions.
- 9.2 Recent experience of, and unnecessary and excessive expenditure on, Wellington Square absent prior consultation and in a manner inconsistent with Council policy (i.e. reducing black heat sink footpaths) does not instil confidence in administrative audit or assessment of need, comparative priorities, or for the effective allocation and expenditure of resources. The footpaths were in good order and replaced with black heat-sink bitumen without any camber to avoid water pooling. There was no effort to include anything of artistic, heritage, or playfulness interest to walkers or users of the Square. The park lands distinctive lighting in apparent good working order was replaced with light structures used in city streets despite being informed that there would be no change. At least the footpath layout was unaltered. It is difficult to reconcile that infrastructure work being of greater priority than leveling and lighting many footpaths in need of care and attention.
- 9.3 Recent experience of the Charles Street capital investment is also instructive. It ought to be the subject of a 6 & 12 month 'post-completion debrief/critique' or an 'implementation assessment of what the experience taught us' (what is undermining the capital investment?).





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That is self-evident from these photos: lighting is harsh; paver staining from detritus; paver staining from pot watering/drainage; and an 'unloved' fire hydrant.

There is a lost opportunity: there is no artistic, creative or informational elements for walking interest (curvature in drain covers adds interest).



- 9.4 There are extensive amounts allocated to "main street revitalisation".
 - a) Leaving aside the pejorative inference in the use of 'revitalisation', the extent of expenditure is not supported other than for *necessary* expenditure on the walkability and amenity of footpaths, lighting, street crossing, and creating interest within the context of the character and heritage of the locality. However, such capital investment ought to focus on the intended human experience of the investment outcome and avoid the cost of lost opportunities for effective local contextual enhancement of the public realm.³
 - b) That part of each main street that is used by vehicular traffic is in good order and does not require revision or renewal. The road surfaces do not require "revitalisation".
 - c) There are existing safe and convenient opportunities for "active transport" in adjacent streets and paths established throughout the Park Lands.
 - d) In addition, rather than expend any monies on alterations to the roadway or parking, such funds would be better redirected into the **heritage incentive fund** to make available to main street building owners funding to maintain the character of building frontages or to encourage frontages becoming listed. That would significantly add value to the built form distinctive character of the main streets within the residential localities: O'Connell and Melbourne Steets and Hutt Street.
 - e) The option of adopting suburban 40kph speed limits presently applicable to other suburban roads would remain available in conjunction with the use of scatter or pedestrian priority crossings, additional greening, enabling reinstatement of awnings and verandas, and extending pedestrian priority footpaths across minor streets that are perpendicular with the main street.

³ TNAS made a detailed submission about the "O'Connell Street Revitalisation Paver Trial" largely to the effect that the proposed two options provided is not only an example of 'push-polling' but would represent a gross (lost) opportunity and an avoidable capital expense if either were to be adopted.



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- f) Improving comfortable and conducive walkability, local interest footpath experience, built form interest and usage, introduction of artistic/creative/informational elements, and conducive lighting within the context of the character of the locality of the main street will be more productive than altering the existing roadway for vehicular traffic.
- g) Improving objective post-implementation assessment would provide a knowledge and experience base for improving conducive capital investment outcomes that are both cost and public realm effective.
- 9.5 TNAS has previously indicated its views about various main street proposals and the proposed Light Square redesign options. The option for a gross alteration to Light Square roadway contemplates a grossly exorbitant cost for at best marginal (if any) benefit, when there are more effective less expensive immediate options for early improvement.
- 9.6 If there is to be the extent of tree planting and greening commensurate with the proposed expenditure, that would be supported subject to location and assessment of comparative priorities, ensuring necessary regular watering to improve early years growth, and avoiding the use of contradictory plastic structures (e.g. Halifax/Hutt cnr).
- 9.7 For a capital city once known for its support of the arts and creativity, it is not clear that the previous approach of a set percentage of the cost of capital works being allocated to public art and artistic creativity is included in the draft budget; its absence would be regressive, its inclusion useful.



- 9.8 Capital project funding for structures for community sports facilities on Park Lands has presumably been the subject of political processes. TNAS urges design and siting to avoid above ground impacts.
- 9.9 The CoA ought to **address its structures** on Park Lands and ensure minimal (or no) impact.



Rates

- 9.10 Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget includes "a 5.6% rate revenue increase" and "introduction of a minimum rate of \$600 per year".
- 9.11 The extent of rate revenue required is a function of the proposed expenditure and other revenue sources.
- 9.12 It is not apparent from the consultation material whether or what applicable multipliers were applied vis a vis construction, employment and materials.

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- 9.13 There appears to be a considerable proposed expenditure on infrastructure works, consultants, and preliminary design and consultation processes in circumstances where the purpose, extent, or outcome of the proposed works is questionable, unwarranted, unsubstantiated, or of doubtful priority.
- 9.14 The introduction of a minimum rate seems appropriate having regard to its quantum and that the CoA services and facilities are available to the owner of a rateable property irrespective of its size, nature or use.
- 9.15 It is noted that a financial hardship process is available to a CoA ratepayer.

 - b) State and federal government agencies conducting the business of governance or engaged in fee for service activity within the CoA; educational and tertiary institutions operating their businesses within the CoA; and leaseholders, businesses premises, and fee for entry activities on the Adelaide Park Lands ought to become rateable or liable to contribute to the cost of city governance (services and infrastructure) based on rateable equivalence i.e., as if they were rateable.
 - c) Such equitable reform could be transitioned into effect over a reasonable period.

Our submission questions / concerns:

 We belive our "Precinct Funding is listed under AEDA pg 55/56 - Main Street Dev Grants / Precinct Activation

The Committee have raised serious concerns around the lack of communication and transparency in relation to the AEDA CofA Precinct Group Review - we are still waiting feedback after previous cancelled meetings with ADEA and understand the recommendations are still sitting with with new CofA CEO. There is no clarity in the budget around proposed funding and how this will be applied. We believe it's of vital importance that the budget draft is not finalised before clarification around this is given so that all Precinct Groups are also able to prepare accordingly ahead of the new financial year.

Please assist us to locate where the lines for upgrade works are for Hindley St? and if there is any
factor of funds to progress next steps for Light Square ie all the traffic analysis etc just so we
understand.

Again we have been awaiting clarification from CofA regarding this vital upgrade, if the State Government will be providing additional funding to enhance the original designs and proposal or not. As per our last meeting with key parties including the Lord Mayor we were assured at minimum the original design would proceed and works would commence by the end of this calendar year, we belive it is also vital there is clarity in this budget around the previous allocation of funds for these works. We understand from the team that the small allocation for this year is for construction - it would be extremely helpful to have some more definitive time lines to give all the stakeholders a sense of the plan and ultimately some reassurance that things are moving forward with positive momentum.

We were also given indications that Light Square concept designs would be progressed to next steps we understand that now that the next steps are covered in the 24/25 budget, given there is no allocation for this next budget, we would deeply appreciate an indication of the next steps and how we can best support this incredible opportunity for Adelaide and the West End.

• Finally re the City Activation budget lines (page 28) Why are there such significant differences between the key precincts? What are these differing amounts covering?

We understand now this is based on historical spends, however It's really important to us in the West End that that city activation is shared fairly across the city, esp given the size of the precinct and our potential for growth from the right investment. We believe there needs to be transparent and equitable allocation of activation budgets based on a clear set of factors from, visitation, economic and community impact.

We would be extremely grateful to receive any feedback from staff or Councillors relating to these concerns and welcome any opportunity to discuss further should that be of assistance.

City of Adelaide Draft Budget Consultation 2025/26

Outdoor Dining and Parklet Fees Public Comment

On behalf of numerous Adelaide restaurants, bars, cafes, and hospitality operators who have made significant investments in outdoor dining infrastructure, including parklets, we submit the following comment regarding the Fees and Charges Schedule, specifically those related to Outdoor Dining and Parklet fees.

1. Fee for Loss of Parking Revenue: A Partial Solution

Council's decision to remove the loss of car parking revenue charge component from parklet fees (based on the motion moved in late 2024) is acknowledged and appreciated. But not at the expense of other parklet owners.

We believe this reform does not go far enough. The broader structure of outdoor dining fees remains burdensome and inconsistent. Businesses that invest in activating public space with outdoor dining, particularly during a time when consumer habits demand more alfresco experiences, should not be penalised for contributing to city vibrancy. We acknowledge that while the proposed standard fee of \$165 per square metre may be suitable for some larger venues, it represents an increased expense for many smaller cafés for example, Penny University Café. This flat-rate structure does not consider the varying capacities and margins of smaller businesses and may unintentionally create a barrier to their participation in outdoor dining initiatives.

2. Learning from Leading Cities: The Case of the City of Sydney

In March 2025, the City of Sydney made the progressive decision to permanently waive all outdoor dining fees, a move that was unanimously supported by its Council. The City of Sydney recognised that:

- Outdoor dining enhances street life and encourages foot traffic.
- Hospitality businesses are key partners in post-pandemic economic recovery.
- Simplifying and supporting access to outdoor space invites more people into the city and keeps them there longer.

This decision sends a clear message: that outdoor dining is not a cost to be recouped, but an investment in the vibrancy, safety, greening and economic vitality of urban spaces. Why wouldn't the City of Adelaide adopt this already proven successful structure?

3. A Call for Reform

We strongly urge Council to abolish all outdoor dining fees in the 2025/26 financial year and beyond, in alignment with Sydney and other forward-thinking cities. This is not about eliminating revenue, it's about choosing a strategic investment in:

- City activation and post-pandemic economic recovery.
- Public realm transformation into welcoming, community-friendly spaces.
- Increased pedestrian dwell time, spending, and cultural engagement.
- Tourism appeal and competitiveness with suburban venues, beer gardens and interstate destinations.

Conclusion

Outdoor dining is not a luxury; it is a proven economic and social development strategy. Fees that punish businesses for contributing to Adelaide's revival, particularly when they voluntarily green and enliven underused public space, are counterproductive.

We would like to express our appreciation to the City of Adelaide for its annual support through the Adelaide Economic Development Agency (AEDA), and to request consideration of an increase in AEDA's 'Event and Festival Sponsorship' funding. This support has been instrumental in cementing Adelaide Festival's reputation as Australia's premier arts festival and a major driver of economic and cultural activity for the city.

The Adelaide Festival plays a critical role in the vibrancy and prosperity of Adelaide's economy and cultural identity. In 2024:

- The Festival generated \$76.8 million in gross expenditure
- · It attracted over 555,000 attendances across free and ticketed events
- · More than 1,500 artists were engaged across a diverse program of local and international work; and
- Approximately 30% of attendees came from interstate or overseas, contributing significantly to tourism, hospitality, and accommodation sectors.

These figures reflect the Festival's capacity to deliver not only artistic excellence but also tangible returns for the City of Adelaide and its businesses. Despite the growing impact of events like the Adelaide Festival, AEDA's 'Event and Festival Sponsorship' funding has remained under \$2 million for several years (\$1.93 in 24/25 and increasing to \$1.99m in 25/26), while:

- · Festival delivery costs have increased substantially due to inflation and logistical pressures
- Expectations for accessibility, sustainability, and safety have grown
- Opportunities to strengthen the city's economic resilience through culture are being constrained by static resourcing

An increase in AEDA's budget would enhance its capacity to support not just the Adelaide Festival, but a broader ecosystem of events, precincts, businesses, and tourism. This uplift would strengthen the City of Adelaide's position as a vibrant, year-round cultural destination, driving increased foot traffic, overnight stays, and spending across hospitality, retail, and accommodation sectors. A stronger AEDA would also enable more strategic investment in precinct activation, international promotion, and business growth—benefiting residents, workers, and visitors alike while reinforcing the city's global reputation as a premier place to live, work, invest, and visit.

Alignment with the City of Adelaide's 2025–2026 Business Plan and Budget

The City of Adelaide's Draft 2025–2026 Business Plan and Budget outlines strategic goals that align closely with the work of the Adelaide Festival and AEDA, including:

- "Celebrating and elevating our community" by investing in public events and experiences that engage residents and visitors.
- "Creating a vibrant city" through activation, collaboration, and support for the arts and culture sector.
- "Building a responsive economy" by supporting business growth, tourism, and employment.

Response to the City of Adelaide Draft 2025/26 Business Plan and Budget

The Australian Institute of Architects (the Institute) represents over 1000 members in South Australia. The architectural profession contributes significantly to the liveability, amenity and identity of the City of Adelaide. In addition, the Institute regularly engages with the City of Adelaide in relation to strategic projects, consultation on built environment issues and policies and through participation in workshops and other activities.

The City of Adelaide Prize is one example of the collaborative working relationship between the Council and the Institute. Established in 2009, the City of Adelaide Prize celebrates projects that add to the quality of the City's built urban environment. Projects can be submitted by architects as well as other creative disciplines, including landscape architects, engineers and artists.

Over the past 16 years, entries have included artworks, urban design and streetscape projects, civic, commercial, hospitality and cultural buildings as well as playgrounds, active recreation facilities and exhibitions. The entries highlight the diversity of projects – public and private - delivered in the City and the wealth of creative talent that exists in Adelaide.

The Prize demonstrates the many and varied facets that make our city one of the most liveable in the world. It showcases projects that promote active lifestyles, support cultural engagement, attract tourists and engage the local community, enhance vibrancy, improve sustainability and make the City a better place to live and work. All of these qualities are supportive of the Council's Strategic Plan.

It is therefore with considerable disappointment that the Institute notes that there is no budget allowed for the City of Adelaide Prize in the 2025/2026 budget. The Institute asks that the following is considered:

- 1. The City of Adelaide Prize received a very modest \$30,000 budget allowance in 2024/2025. Of this, \$26,500 was provided to the Institute to manage and administer the Prize. The Institute provides services including hosting entries on the Institute's awards platform, managing the jury process, delivery of the People's Choice Prize, media relating to the Prize, and award of the Prize at the SA Awards Presentation Event. The remainder of the budget is allocated to Council support for promotion, marketing and oversight of the Institute's delivery.
- The funding provided to the Institute has remained unchanged for the past 10 years. This Institute has maintained the quality of delivery throughout this time and has worked with the Council to review and update the Prize criteria to reflect changing strategic priorities.
- The Prize provides an opportunity for the City of Adelaide to engage with the design community that delivers significant projects that contribute to the overall amenity of the

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- City. A council representative participates as a member of the jury for the Prize. 5 Council representatives also receive complem ntary tickets to the Awards Presentation Event.
- 4. The Prize provides the City of Adelaide with information and images highlighting the range and quality of projects occurring within the City. This provides the City of Adelaide with an overview of the key projects delivered in the preceding 2 years and the benefits that they have provided to the local community, the broader Adelaide population and visitors.

The Institute sincerely hopes that the decision to defund the City of Adelaide Prize is reversed and that the Prize continues into the future. We are open to reviewing the Prize criteria on a regular basis to ensure that the Prize aligns with key strategic objectives identified by the City of Adelaide and look forward to continuing what we believe is a productive and mutually beneficial program.

I have two key concerns regarding the current draft business plan and proposed budget:

1. Lack of tangible benefits for families residing in the city

While the plan references general park improvements, it lacks specifics—particularly around playground upgrades. As a parent, I find it disappointing that key play areas like the South Terrace Glover Playground and Princess Elizabeth Playspace remain underwhelming, outdated, and frankly, a poor use of valuable space. These areas are in serious need of thoughtful redesign and meaningful investment to meet the needs of young families in the city. The current state of these playgrounds does not reflect a city committed to supporting family life.

For single and professional residents, the inclusion of more outdoor fitness facilities would also be a welcome and forward-thinking improvement, aligning with modern park standards and encouraging healthy, active lifestyles.

2. Addressing affordability and support for city residents

It would be valuable to see how the business plan addresses the broader issue of urban affordability. Clear strategies or initiatives that support residents—whether through housing, cost-of-living measures, or local services—would make the plan feel more balanced and responsive to those who live and work here every day.

I hope this feedback is taken into consideration and reaches the right channels.

I hope this message finds you well. My name is Stevie Pitt, and I am a speech pathologist working for the Central Adelaide Local Health Network. I'm also a volunteer with Lifeline Adelaide and a proud city resident on Halifax Street with a deep investment in the social, cultural and environmental wellbeing of our community.

Firstly, thank you for producing such a clear and forward-looking draft of the 2025–26 Business Plan and Budget. Due to recent travel, I unfortunately missed the formal consultation window, but I'm grateful for the opportunity to still share a few reflections as a passionate and community-minded resident.

I commend the City's commitment to revitalising infrastructure, supporting community inclusion, and prioritising climate resilience. In the spirit of that commitment, I'd like to gently offer a few ideas that I hope may contribute to the ongoing development of a city that truly works for everyone, all the time.

1. Greener Cities and More Pakapakanthi-Style Spaces

I want to acknowledge how much I value the Pakapakanthi Wetlands. I often walk there and regularly hear enthusiastic feedback from friends, colleagues and visitors. It's a shining example of accessible, ecologically vibrant design that benefits both mental wellbeing and biodiversity. I wonder if Council might consider opportunities to develop similar tranquil, green spaces in other parts of the city, particularly where people may have fewer opportunities to connect with nature.

2. More Responsive and Inclusive Public Transport

Public transport remains a key pillar of urban equity. During recent festival periods, I heard repeated feedback from interstate visitors about long tram wait times, even during high-demand hours. Many expressed surprise that frequency wasn't adjusted to match peak periods. Could the Council explore stronger partnerships with transit providers to advocate for dynamic, real-time scheduling during events, ensuring public transport truly enables our city's vibrancy and accessibility?

3. Community Gardens and Connection

Community gardens are more than green spaces—they are neighbourhood anchors. Particularly when codesigned with local residents and First Nations input, they support food security, mental health, and shared pride. I'd love to see these projects supported more widely, including in areas with dense residential populations or limited green access.

4. Dignity and Safety for People in Crisis: A Social ED Concept

As someone who works alongside people experiencing homelessness, mental health crises, and life disruption, I deeply support the City's ongoing work through its Homelessness Strategy and Housing initiatives. In addition to housing-focused responses, I'd also like to share a future-focused idea I've heard echoed in community discussions:

What if our city had a Social Emergency Department (Social ED)?

Just as a hospital ED responds to health emergencies, a Social ED could be a dedicated, welcoming space for people in non-medical crises—whether facing domestic violence, housing precarity, family breakdown, or mental distress. Staffed by social workers, peer support and community connectors, it could offer early stabilisation and link people into appropriate services.

I completely acknowledge that this concept may be bold or beyond the immediate scope of Council alone—it would likely require strong collaboration with state and federal partners. That said, I believe initiatives like this can reflect our city's aspiration to be humane, preventative, and inclusive by design, recognising that anyone may face hardship at some point in their lives.

I understand the challenges of balancing ambition with sustainability, and I truly respect the careful, valuesdriven planning evident in this draft. Thank you again for your work, and for considering these reflections as part of our city's shared future.

Feedback

- Strong support for bike infrastructure and also for increase in frequency of the free City Loop.
 Needs to be every 15 minutes so that you don't have to look up a timetable, but can just wait.
 Needs to be extended later in the night too.
- Medium strip used to be well maintained but now overrun and unkempt
- In favour of a rate rise to maintain the upkeep of the City
- Free City Loop is great but need to be later at night - can catch bus to North Adelaide for movies or dinner but can't catch it back as it finishes early. Should also be more regular (every 15 minutes). It is currently mainly suited for people doing things in business hours - but students would use it after hours too.
- Business owner (hotel). Not in favour of rate increase, rates are already very expensive.
- In favour of Hindley Street revitalisation project and wants this project to be done as soon as possible. Provided feedback in last consultation on this revitalisation but has not had an update on this project for quite some time. Their hotel customers comment on the eastern section of Hindley Street being run down, and this is the main transit corridor for their customers. Likes the idea of planter boxes in the revitalisation plan however is concerned that they may be used for waste e.g. as toilets, ash trays etc. Bus stop signage of free connector could be improved, the map is complicated
- The closure of toilets at night in the area has led to an increase in defecation and urinations in lanes and other public spaces (Sia Furler Lane and outdoor areas of 128 Hindley Street)
- Opposed to transportation changes that impact on drivers e.g. cycling infrastructure/bus lanes when coming to the city drives in and road corridors and parking are a priority. Don't lower speed limits (if anything, increase is needed given the bus lanes on major roads - bus lanes take up too much road space)
- Uses public transport when visiting the city, wants frequent, reliable and fast public transport.
- Uses tram but frustrated by other passenger behaviour. Don't stand in entrance way especially if there are plenty of empty seats. Also, wait for people to get off before getting on.
- Adelaide's 'deadly' moved to Adelaide from NSW 4 years ago and loves Adelaide
- Comes to the city to walk around to get exercise, not to shop or visit anywhere in particular - the train is a quick way to get into the City as opposed to buses which take longer winding routes.

- Interested in support for start-ups, discussed AEDA's role and provided AEDA business plan and contact details. Interest in Fin Tech, sustainability and recycling.
- City visitor who always catches the train in and says Seniors Card works well. Just comes to city to walk and see sites - Torrens River, North Terrace (space museum and library). Likes the noise and atmosphere of the City
- Major concerns around rates believes it is cheaper to live in a Torrens Title house in the suburbs. The Discretionary Discounts are problematic - rates determined by potential income for rental which means the rate if often too high and requires discretionary discount.
- The problem for many people in the City is that they have strata or community Title fees to pay on top of rates
- Used to offer discount for concession holders but don't do this anymore
- Should offer an incentive to keep older people who are on fixed income living in the City. There are not a lot of residents in this scenario so it wouldn't cost much and it would also make it more attractive for other retirees to come to City. Messaging should be 'retire in the city and we will look after you'
- Higher density living often has strata or community fees and so we should have a policy to recognise this and give a rates discount
- Determining rates using rental figure should be different for owner/occupiers.
- Concern regarding impact on parking for events held in Victoria Square. This also impacts traders and markets. Could do events in outer Park Lands or consider parking in South Park Lands and shuttle bus in. Outside visitors particularly use cars to travel to city
- BP&B should have income identified by source and then match expenditure accordingly.
- Loves the library in the Mall
- Main issue with Comets soccer club is again around parking and traffic issues on West Terrace. Should remove parking on corner Gilbert St and West Tce - parking there is a risk.
- Developers need to consider that often each bedroom has someone with a car and should consider parking.
- Free seniors travel is great encouraged train trips especially when things were slower due to Covid.
